The Resurrection of Jesus

24 But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. ² They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, ³ but when they went in, they did not find the body. ⁴ While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. ⁵ The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. ⁶ Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, ⁷ that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." ⁸ Then they remembered his words, ⁹ and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. ¹⁰ Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. ¹¹ But these words seemed to them

Reflection

Hymn writers so often manage to find a way of saying what I'd love to say, but they manage it much better. For me, there has often been the connection between words and music that somehow expresses something from deep within that would never find expression any other way. So I am grateful for hymn writers old and not so old.

John Bell & Graham Maule are two writers that I have come to value in recent years because of their insight and use of language, that brings a more modern turn of phrase to things we thought we always knew.

I was once asked to do the Myers-Briggs personality indicator test to see what I came out with. It will be of little surprise to many of you that I came out as being strongly introvert. Perhaps this is why, when it comes to Easter Day, I value most of all the way Jesus was discovered by Mary and the other women, and the way he came back.

I think I value this for two reasons. Maundy Thursday and Good Friday take a lot of emotional energy and by Sunday I still feel drained from rehearsing again all the things that Jesus went through, and of course ending Friday with that image of him strung up on the cross.

Being drained of emotional energy and being more introverted than extroverted means I value the way Jesus rose from the dead without fanfare or great fuss. He quietly allowed people to come and see for themselves and gently allowed the penny to drop as they remembered some of the things he had said about himself. Then they began to understand what actually come to pass.

I cannot help but link it with his birth in Bethlehem. If you believe the carols, it was a silent night when Jesus was born, and although shepherds were told and wise men followed on, it was almost as if Jesus' birth was secretive like his resurrection.

But then, I'm reminded of this image:



which says to me that God in Christ is gentle. He does not force his way into peoples' lives. He does not want the world and its wife to know what he is doing in the affairs of those who seek him or follow him.

This image says to me that Jesus is truly a gentle man. But let that not suggest he is not present or waiting or offering us opportunities.

On that first Easter morning, it was as if the whole world were sleeping when the most amazing thing happened. God in Christ defeated death, offered us hope and new life and eternal life with God.

As much as I like and enjoy the rousing Easter hymns (and it is always difficult to know which *not* to choose), for me it is the quiet revelation that Jesus makes in the garden that first Easter morning that has the deepest impact, the lasting impact. It is what resonates deep within.

If Jesus were too much like one of us, then I suspect the desire to say "I told you so" would have been just too tempting. But you see his resurrection was about the fulfilment of prophecy in the widest sense. This Easter morning is as much about celebrating God keeping his promises, as it is celebrating the new life that is offered to everyone by the fact of the resurrection.

This was the most world-changing event in all of the earth's history, yet Jesus speaks gently and lovingly to Mary. Even now, even when anyone else might want to shout it from the roof tops, Jesus gently comes to where people are and reveals himself with overflowing love and compassion and care.

Now of course we also hear the bit of the story where they go and tell the remaining eleven disciples who don't believe them at all, until Peter goes to look for himself. Sometimes we can want to make a point that the first people to share the Good News were women. Sometimes we laugh at the disciples for not understanding what Jesus said or that it might come true.

Perhaps the other side of all of this, is that for some people it will be very hard to just accept the story that we are now so familiar with. It may be met with disbelief. And that's OK.

It is OK because that is how the disciples first reacted, it is OK because it is a natural response. It is OK, because whatever Jesus

taught the disciples before his death, it wasn't until after, when they had some indication themselves, that the penny started to drop.

We can be like Mary, and we can share the story and sing our praises to God. We can be loud about it or quiet about it. But the story of that first Easter Day tells me that it is not our understanding alone that allows us to understand Christ is risen, but God already working in our hearts and minds.

Quietly and confidently we can share with each other and with anyone what we really believe about this Easter story, and sometimes it is in our sharing of the story that we become surprised about just how convinced we are that Jesus is alive.

So, I would encourage us all to share the Good News, with all the love and compassion and care that Jesus does on that first Easter morning, and see where it is that God leads us.

Maybe this Easter morning you are looking out of the window, seeing the flowers or hearing the birds sing. But just take that moment or two to think about how you came to know that Jesus is alive and how you know he is with us still. For then we can sing those great Easter hymns with all the more conviction and energy.

endless is the vict'ry thou o'er death hast won.*


Lo! Jesus meets us, risen from the tomb;

bring us safe thro' Jordan to thy home above.


Blessing
