From the Manse.....

There have been plenty of comments, jokes and Gifs on social media in recent weeks about how we seem to have lost our sense of routine, and the difficulty we sometimes have in trying to remember what day of the week it is! A much longer version if you like of the confusion that is often found between Christmas and New Year, when we try to remember which days are when.

This time round it has been enforced upon us by a global pandemic rather than a global celebration and consequently for a great number of people that regular pattern of daily life is now missing, it has gone A.W.O.L.

So many of the activities that mapped out our day or week giving us a sense of rhythm have now been abandoned and are no longer there.

What this has done of course is to make us live far more in the present than we have perhaps been used to, thereby helping us to make the most of the moment.

We now recognise that trying to plan for anything in the future, or too far ahead, is so difficult, if not impossible.

I have just been told that a weekend away that was planned and booked last year has now been cancelled and consequently, I have been offered the chance to either rebook or receive a full refund.

I decided straight away that I am going for the full refund, for even if I rebook for a number of months' time, will I still find myself in a similar position later on?

The days in which we now live tell us that to plan for this day, or a week ahead at the most, is about as good as it gets at the moment.

In response to the announcements from the government, the Methodist Connexion is looking at what it will mean for us as a church and how we might cautiously progress in the weeks and months that are to come.

As to when we might be allowed back into our buildings for worship and what restrictions will still be placed upon us, nobody knows at this stage.

In the last book of the Bible, The Revelation of John, we find in Chapter one, verse eight: "I am the Alpha and the Omega', says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty."

Our God who was there before anything came into being, our God who will be there long after all is finished and of course our God who is with us in the present, in the here and now.

I wonder how much time we spend in the past or in the future and because of that, miss out on the present?!

Whilst the events of the past may still have some hold over us or ensnare us, it is the present where we really live.

Whilst the future may entice us to look for that which is to come, luring us into something unseen and yet to be experienced, it is the here and now where we actually exist.

The good news is that we can trust God for the present, for this day, this moment in time, this hour, because of the past and the future.

The knowledge that we can live expectantly in the reality of this day because of the truth of what has been and the hope of what is to come, can often be found running through the psalms.

It is summed up too by Charles Wesley who writes:

"Tis Jesus, the First and the Last, Whose Spirit shall guide us safe home; We'll praise him for all that is past, And trust him for all that's to come.

Can You help MHA?

MHA are asking for your support for their staff, residents and their families, during what is a very challenging time.

As a national charity they are committed to enabling older people to live later life well in our care homes, retirement living schemes and our community groups. They have been working tirelessly to adapt their activities to ensure people are given the personcentred care and support they require, no matter what the circumstances.

Amidst the Covid-19 pandemic, the committed workforce have been working tirelessly to support our 6,000 residents. However, they have been doing so without a steady and secure supply of personal protective equipment (PPE) and the majority without testing for the virus, which would help to further protect both them and the residents.

MHA have been petitioning the government since the outset of the pandemic to address these shortfalls and to recognise the vulnerability of those in care homes, alongside those in the NHS. Only now is it starting to be recognised that the care homes are the second front line and need to be properly equipped with all the tools to safely do that job.

Additionally, PPE is needed so families are able to say farewell to their loved ones as they approach the end of their lives, as they are not currently allowed in care homes for the protection of residents, staff and themselves.

As there is still no guarantee in the government's supply chain, MHA have maintained an adequate supply of PPE by purchasing from commercial suppliers but continue to be charged up to five times more per item of personal protective equipment. A face mask that used to cost around 20p is now costing us \pounds 1.

You can donate to help MHA purchase the vital PPE that are we needed – face masks, gloves, goggles, aprons and gowns, vital to limit spread of the virus and protect staff, residents and their relatives.

You can sign the on-line petition to ask the Government to ensure adequate and consistent supplies of PPE and timely and ample testing for all residents and staff.

Please encourage friends and family to do the same.

Thank you for your continued support during this time. MHA are committed, now more than ever, to enabling people to live later life well.

Wantage & Grove Street Pastors – Quarterly News – April 2020

How quickly our lives have changed, and in ways that none of us could have imagined only a few weeks ago. On 17 March, our Management Committee met and decided to suspend Street Pastor patrols until further notice, with the aim of protecting our volunteers and helping to prevent the spread of Coronavirus. It seems that, as individuals, families, communities and as a nation, we are in uncharted waters; heading out in to the unknown together. Whenever Street Pastors go on patrol, they go out in to the unknown - and often in to the dark. They have with them a few supplies, mostly to help other people. But they don't go unprepared; with the help of Prayer Support Volunteers, they start in prayer, seeking the Lord's guidance, protection and provision. And they head out, turning to prayer as different situations arise. More now than ever, this should be the daily pattern of our lives: start in prayer - head out in prayer. Maybe even, as it says in 1 Thessalonians Ch 5, "Pray without ceasing"! Like Street Pastors, we are all here to be a blessing, to bring hope - a light in the dark, a listening ear, a friendly face.

Ascension Trust

Ascension Trust (AT) is the governing body for 8 church-led initiatives, the most wellknown of which is Street Pastors. Their mission is to empower Christians to work together within their local community to improve the quality of life for disadvantaged and vulnerable people. Other AT ministries are School Pastors, Rail Pastors and most recently, Response Pastors - who are deployed in times of major incidents and crisis such as the Grenfell Tower Fire and terrorist attacks in London. In 2009, Eustace and Sharon Constance came to Wantage to start our training and we were delighted that they were able to return and join in our 10th Anniversary Celebration in October 2019. We don't like to show off, but we were rather pleased when they presented us with this beautiful plaque recognising our 10-year achievement. The inscription reads: *"Presented to Wantage and Grove Street Pastors in appreciation from Ascension Trust for 10 years of dedication, commitment and loyal service given to the work of Street Pastors".*

How we helped on the Streets

We met a group of three young men who were supporting a fourth man who had had too much to drink. We gave a bottle of water and stayed with them while they decided what they were going to do with their drunk friend. The drunk man didn't want to go in a taxi and was insistent on walking home. Our team walked with them some of the way until it was clear that they could make good progress on their own.

We met a couple and asked if they were okay as the woman was injured. They said they were fine so we left them but made sure to go back that way soon after. When we went back, the lady confirmed that she was fine and safe. We later saw the couple trying to get a taxi. The man stopped a passing car and got the lady in it and walked off. We spoke to the driver and, realising that he was not a registered taxi, got the lady out and found a genuine taxi for her. It turned out that she knew the driver, which we were all very glad about.

One night we found a lost phone and wallet. The phone rang in our hands and the person on the other end asked, 'who are you?' We explained that we were Street

Pastors and had found the phone and wallet. With the help of the caller we were able to re-unite the phone and wallet with a very grateful young lady.

One of our teams offered help to an older man who was staggering about in town with the aid of a walking stick. Our help was declined, but we ran to his aid after he fell while standing in a doorway - having let go of his walking stick. Thinking that he had probably relieved himself, our team (now wearing gloves) got the man to his feet and bravely assisted with doing his belt up. Unfortunately, it took two more falls and two more attempts at getting the belt buckle in the right hole before the man's trousers were adequately secured and he was able to make his way home in moderate safety.

All in a night's work for our brave Street Pastors! Well done!

Management Committee Goals

Each year our Management Committee sets goals to help focus our efforts and to ensure that we continue to serve our community well. Our 2020/21 goals are centred around delivering patrols, finances and relationships.

Volunteers are at the heart of everything we do - we would not exist without all those who so generously give their time to serve. We would love to have more volunteers to build resilience within our teams and to extend how we serve the community. King Alfred's Academy has asked us to be a presence in the town when children and young people finish their day, as some youngsters can be most vulnerable outside of the formal school day. Efforts to start some afternoon patrols have yet to come to fruition - we don't quite have enough volunteers to make it happen. We do need people to join as Street Pastors and Prayer Support Volunteers to maintain our level of service in Wantage and Grove, to improve what we are already doing and to branch out into new opportunities.

Finances are needed to run any charity and we need about £15k per year. The Lord has been faithful in providing what we need and we are very thankful for individuals and churches who regularly contribute. More support in this way would be fantastic as we know that the few grants we receive may not be sustainable in the future.

Our member churches are our core community of support, so we endeavour to hold a *Street Pastor Sunday* in each church this year. By this, Christians in our community can hear first-hand what God is doing in our town and the difference it makes to have people gathering to pray over the area while others are out on patrol. We also plan to hold other events this year, which seek to increase support in prayer, volunteering and finance.

Thank you for the ways that you help us to achieve our goals. We can't do it without you - Thank you!

How we helped on the Streets

Street Pastors patrolled 5 times in January, 5 in February and 4 times in March. Fourteen patrols providing 64 hours of cover. Giving lollies is not only a nice way of saying 'hello' but they also put some sugar back in the blood stream - which helps

reduce aggression and confusion in those that have had a lot to drink. They sometimes come in handy for helping to quieten down noisy individuals! We've not patrolled since the end of March but we hope to get back to the streets as soon as we are able!

Wantage & Grove Food Bank

Well it has been an interesting start to 2020!!

We do really appreciate all the support you give to FoodBank and the inhabitants of our town and surrounding villages - whether that is by manning the phone, collecting & sorting food, delivering parcels or praying! I know for some of you it has been a frustrating time as you have had to take a step back in order to look after your own health or the health of others in your household - we would much rather you stay safe and well rather than put yourselves at risk though!

In the midst of all the uncertainty - we can say that God is good and he does provide. We have been inundated with offers of help, of monetary donations, and now there is food on the shelves once more, the supermarket collections are providing a steady stream. We have also been blessed by the generosity of Waitrose & Ray Collins each providing a significant amount of food early on, and in the case of Waitrose putting food aside for us so we could pick up items that were in short supply. I think though even at the height of the food shortages we were still the only place with loads of pasta!! (we still have plenty even now!)

So some figures for you:

This year up to the end of April we have delivered over 200 parcels!!

March 2020 - 59 parcels (95 adults & 105 children) (cf. March 2019 - 31 parcels)

April 2020 - 71 parcels (120 adults & 111 children) (cf. April 2019 - 38 parcels)

Things seem to be calming down to a more manageable level for now - but there is no doubt we will be needed for some time to come. We will try and re-schedule the Volunteers Training Evening for a date in the Autumn - assuming small gatherings will be allowed by then.

So thank you & keep praying - in particular for:

our volunteers who are self-isolating/shielding.

those who have found themselves out of work unexpectedly

the clients with poor mental health

the other agencies we work with e.g. independent advice centre, health visitors etc

and thank God for his provision and protection

Pastoral

In our May Newsletter we recorded the deaths of **Doug White** and **Pam Rose**, and this was followed by news that **Sheila Penney**, also a resident at the Wantage Nursing Home, had died too. Each announcement was made with sadness, and all will be missed from our Church family. It seemed, as well, that these losses would be intensified because of the restrictions preventing their funerals taking place in the usual manner. **Pam's and Doug's funerals** were indeed different from what they would have been before circumstances prohibited gatherings of more than a very small number of people. However, Pam's funeral on Monday 18th May, and Doug's two days later, both exceeded the expectation with which these occasions had been anticipated. Keith's wonderful ability to choose words of great reassurance and comfort, the perfect warm May sunshine on both days, the technology which enabled live streaming from the Crematorium, and the tranquil and naturally beautiful setting

on each occasion, all contributed to services which were uplifting, reassuring, and greatly appreciated by everyone who was able to share in them.

Kelvin's tribute to Pam was a most eloquent and moving expression of the loving relationship they shared, as well as an account of Pam's many achievements, her generous and caring nature, and her many years of service to our church and other charities. As Kelvin returned to his seat, Keith expressed the thoughts of everyone listening, by saying that, if it were not for social distancing, he would have given him a hug, and added that Kelvin had "made us smile, made us cry and had summed up so much of Pam's nature, who she was, and always will be to us". In his address Keith spoke of Pam's younger days, including her honour in becoming the country's first female Bank Manager, and endorsing all of Kelvin's comments about the skills and interests which she enjoyed whilst in good health.

The short time allotted for burial in Challow Cemetery, allowed only Keith the opportunity to speak about Doug. However, it enabled him to reflect on the total dedication with which Marjorie and Colin visited and cared for him whilst he was in the Nursing Home, and being with him in his final moments. Since Julia could not fly from Jersey to attend on 20th May, Keith was able to speak of the last visit to her father and of her sharing of The Lord's Prayer with Doug, - an occasion which was a comfort and joy for them both. At Julia's request, those present shared in saying the traditional form of The Lord's Prayer together. Initially it had been anticipated that only Marjorie, Colin and Keith could gather at Doug's graveside for his burial. In the event, eight other church members were also able to be there, representing the wider church family and offering them love and support for which Marjorie acknowledged hers and Colin's gratitude (see below).

Whilst we regret being unable to meet together in the ways we have hitherto enjoyed, there remains so much for which we feel blessed. We are thankful for the strength, comfort and reassurance which we receive through God's grace, and the faith which we share through our trust in His promises to us. Our Pastoral system is one of the special features of Methodism, through which, hopefully, everyone feels cared for and prayerfully supported. I also hope that everyone who was unable to read the May Newsletter online, received a paper copy. I will try to ensure that this happens with the June edition, and have a list of over twenty people to whom that applies. If you are aware of any additional people needing a paper copy, please let me know so that they can be added to the list (Ann Barber at 01235 767152).
