From the Manse.....

Over the past few weeks there has been an uncertainty about how we might or might not as a nation be able to celebrate Christmas this year.

In the past week or so there has been clarification from the Government along with what is and what is not allowable in that small window between 23rd - 27th December, when there will be a relaxing of the restrictions we are currently living under.

Despite the controversial nature and divided reaction to this decision, newspaper headlines have nevertheless told us that Christmas has been saved and not cancelled - hurrah!

Of course, the notion that Christmas either needs saving or can simply be cancelled is interesting and one I suggest we would wish to both challenge and refute.

Not allowing families to meet in each other's homes for the usual Christmas dinner and the giving of presents, is not the same as Christmas being cancelled.

Oliver Cromwell and the Puritans of the seventeenth Century strongly disapproved of singing and all Christmas festivities, seeing them as wasteful, abhorrent and sinful. They viewed the celebration of Christ's birth as "popish" and argued that God had not called upon humanity to celebrate Christ's nativity in such a manner. As a result, an Act of Parliament in 1644 effectively banned the celebration and in, June 1647, the Long Parliament passed an ordinance confirming the abolition of the feast of Christmas.

Was Christmas cancelled then? No! Whilst even with the easing of restrictions for five days will mean that everyone may not be able to celebrate Christmas this year as they wish and we will be prevented from doing all that we might normally do, Christmas itself, can never be cancelled.

It can never be cancelled for one extremely important reason; Christmas is not what we do, but what God did and does. Which is why to proclaim that Christmas has been saved is to get things the wrong way round. God doesn't need saving, we do! God came to us at Christmas for that simple reason.

He came in human form to show us a better way of living and being. He came among us almost unnoticed so that we might be reunited with Him. At Christmas we acknowledge that we are not on our own and that in the midst of the messiness of our world and lives, God comes alongside us.

May we all be aware of the peace and presence of the Christ Child as we celebrate his birth once more.

Notice from HMG

The Prime Minister has announced that England will be returning to a Local Restriction Tiers system from **2nd December 2020**. We are in Tier 2.

The key thing to note is that **communal worship will be able to restart from 2**nd **December in all Local Restriction Tiers**.

Please note that wherever a gathering can take place, social distancing of 1m+ should still be strictly maintained between anyone who doesn't live together or are not in a 'support bubble.'

The President of the Conference responds to the latest lockdown guidance

Our churches have responded in different and imaginative ways to the challenges of the last few months. Local trustees have had to make the appropriate decision about opening their buildings for worship in response to their context whether that be a national lockdown in England, the firebreak in Wales or all those living with restrictions in Scotland and the Islands of our nations.

The Government has commended the churches on their adherence to the guidance and the care they have taken to help protect worshippers in their buildings. It is sad that the freedom to make those decisions has been removed as part of national efforts to control the spread of the virus in England (as is the case in Wales). We will continue to engage with the Government to try to ensure that where appropriate church buildings can safely reopen for worship sooner rather than later.

Many churches have been at the heart of supporting local communities, for example through food provision, support groups and mutual aid groups. As we enter into periods of new restrictions, we encourage people to continue loving their neighbour through this kind of service. As we have seen, the pandemic and lockdown have hit the poorest and most marginalised the hardest. The Methodist Church, along with others, have been speaking out about the impact of household debt and poverty, and we must continue to do so.

A pastoral message from the Secretary of the Conference

A message from the Revd Dr Jonathan Hustler to the Methodist people following a further lockdown in England and continued restrictions in Wales and Scotland.

I don't want to exaggerate our current situation by suggesting any similarity between our position and his, but I have turned to <u>Dietrich Bonhoeffer</u>'s *Letters and Papers from Prison* as I think about the 'lockdown' that began at midnight today. Even 'lockdown' can seem to be an exaggeration as for many life will not be so very different. Unlike in the Spring, schools and other educational establishments are still open; there is no restriction on the number of times per day that someone can leave their home; churches can be open for individual prayer, funerals, and the live streaming of acts of worship (as always, up-to-date guidance for ministers and managing trustees is available on the <u>Methodist Church website</u>). Our liberty has been restricted for the sake of others; it is going too far (I think) to claim that our liberties have been infringed.

None of that makes lockdown easy; there is a number of reasons why this feels so hard. One is the divergence with which we have to live in the Connexion. As activities in England become more confined, there is soon to be an easing of the restrictions in Wales. Scotland (at the time of writing) continues to operate a policy of regional tiers. The Isle of Man and the Channel Islands have had a very different experience in some respects and may feel more isolated than before from the rest of the British Isles. Remembering that we are one Connexion has never seemed so important.

Another reason that this feels hard is the time of year. Bonhoeffer wrote to his parents on 9 November 1943, 'Now the dismal autumn days have begun and one has to try to get light from within.' I was talking to a friend last week about some practical arrangements which involved meeting outdoors and said that I supposed it was harder than in the Spring because November seems grimmer than April. 'That's because,' he replied, 'November **is** grimmer than April.' This might be one year when we do not complain about preparations for Christmas beginning too early; the Christian message is that it is when the darkness is deepest the light of Christ shines most brightly.

Bonhoeffer continued that letter in November 1943, 'Your letters always help with this.' The discovery of pandemic for me and many others has been the range of communication technology available to us and the simple importance of keeping in touch. One of the principal tasks of ministry (for the whole community not just the ordained) is to maintain the links; that many church buildings had not reopened for worship before governments ordered their closure again was testament to the imaginative ways of sustaining fellowship that had been adopted. Of course, meeting online is not the same as gathering around a table but neither is it simply 'better than nothing' and we shall continue to reflect and to explore what it means to be a church that is drawn together in physical and non-physical ways.

A third reason that this is hard, however, is the (temporary) loss of a church service in those buildings where public worship had resumed. Bonhoeffer wrote in April 1943 of the ringing of the prison chapel bell being the best time to write home. 'It's remarkable what power church bells have over human beings and how deeply they can affect us. So many of life's experiences gather around them.' Meeting in a church building has a similar resonance. It is not simply about being in a particular place for a particular purpose on a particular day but about somewhere that has resonance with an host of memories, both communal and individual. 'I think,' Bonhoeffer went on, 'of all the different parishes I have worked in, then of all the family occasions.... I really cannot count all the memories that come alive to me, and they all inspire peace, thankfulness, and confidence.' At a time when we are anxious about when the restrictions will be lifted, reminding ourselves not of what we are missing but of what has blessed us in the past can be a gateway to peace, thankfulness, and confidence, and not only for us but for one another as, confined to our homes though we might be, we make sure that we keep in touch. 'I don't expect a long letter from you' wrote Bonhoeffer to one of his friends, 'but let's promise to remain faithful in interceding for each other.'

Wantage & Grove Street Pastors

REPORT OF OUR SEPTEMBER & OCTOBER 2020 ACTIVITIES

Our first patrol since the end of March went on to the streets of Wantage on Friday 4 September. Street Pastors maintained a 'social distance' from each other and from members of the public; the latter being easier said than done sometimes.

Street Pastors did not take any lollies out with them, initially, so as to help keep their distance from other people. Of course, many people missed getting a lolly from us although they were glad to see us back on the streets.

We have regularly reviewed our operating procedures following changes in Government regulations. Our Prayer Support Volunteers are 'working from home', patrols are shorter and as a result of pubs closing earlier in the evening, our patrols have started earlier and finished around 10.30 pm. Teams now carry a pack of PPE including visors, plastic aprons and over-shoes, etc. for use in emergency situations that would enable us (or another qualified individual) to deal with life-and-death situations.

We patrolled twice in September and five times in October. There were no serious incidents for us to deal with as our streets were much quieter than we are used to. We spent much of our time talking with people, being a 'listening ear' and encouraging those who are struggling with 'the new normal'. Where a large group of people were gathering outside at closing time, we encouraged them to make their way home.

We were in Wantage when a very large lorry had difficulties navigating the corner of Newbury Street and dragged a parked car some distance into the market square. We called the police and reported the incident. No one was injured.

As of 5 November, a National lockdown has been mandated which will see the streets of Wantage and Grove be almost totally vacated at night. We will continue to review the needs of our communities as time progresses and explore options of what help and support we could offer for the time being.

We were delighted that so many of you were able to join us for the first Zoom Prayer Gathering in October and want to let you know that the **recording** is now available on the Prayer Page of the Street Pastors and Ascension Trust websites (<u>https://www.ascensiontrust.org.uk/prayer-pastors/</u>).

The **Prayer Declaration** we used can be downloaded there too.

I am sure many of you have not seen the **Prayer Page** before; it is new in the last year or so. Do check out the resources there and let the Prayer Team have your comments and ideas!

We are planning another **Zoom Prayer Gathering**, this time in the evening, of **Saturday 5th December (7 – 8.15 pm)**. We are delighted that **Rev Les Isaac**

will be our speaker. On that night we also plan to pray together in groups for the Street/ School/ Rail Pastor projects and the initiatives of Ascension Trust.

Do please pencil this event in to your diary and make a point of registering, so that you get the Zoom ID and Passcode after you have registered nearer the date. The Registration link is below:



- If you wish to use a Bible and hymn book, we encourage you to bring your own wherever possible.
- Please bring your own cushion and bottled water with you if you need them.
- You will need to keep your coats etc. with you.
- You should wear a face covering whilst in church. Some people are exempt from wearing a face covering for various reasons and will not be required to do so while attending worship.
- Sadly we may not sing but can join in with spoken responses.
- There will be no creche, Junior Church or Kids@Church for the time being.
- Should you require to use the toilet at any time, please speak to the "Link" door steward.
- You should sanitise your hands as you leave.
- There will be a basket for any offering you wish to be make either on your way in or way out.
- When the service has ended, please leave promptly in an orderly fashion so as to maintain social distancing.

Coming to a service will always involve an element of risk, although we are committed to making sure that the risk is as small as we can make it. You must decide for yourself whether this is a risk you wish to take and the decision will be different for different people. If you don't want to physically come to a church service that is fine, we are all still one Church.

We are committed to ensure that there will be a **Zoom service** each week either from the service held in church or alongside the service held in church.

Initially there will not be break out groups after Zoom services from when it comes live from the Chapel but we will develop things so that this is possible.

Also other material for worship at home that has been available since lockdown will continue to be supplied.

Pastoral

In this final Newsletter of 2020, we may all be reflecting on what an extraordinary year we've experienced. Our physical involvement with Church, and our participation in worship has never before been so restricted. At present we cannot predict how much will change within the first part of 2021, and so we've had to rethink the distribution of membership tickets. Next year's annual Covenant Service, at which our Pastoral Visitors are re-dedicated and given the membership tickets for the people for their list, will not be in its usual form this time. However, everyone can be reassured that they will receive their membership ticket.

Sadly, there are more deaths of former church members to record this month. On 27th October Katie King died peacefully at home after a long illness. Katie was a member at Wantage for a long time until she transferred to Grove, and her children, Jacqueline and Richard grew up in our Sunday School. The boundary wall at the rear of the site has been found to have moved and we are exploring what needs to be done to ensure the safety of the areas adjacent to it. The movement is away from our site so that the risk is that collapse would be onto the nursery site next door, were it to happen. Potential costs are significant.
