From the Manse.....

What to make of Valentine's Day in the light of living through a global pandemic, I wonder?

Well, magazines, newspapers and social media are full of suggestions as to how to adapt February 14th to make it more Covid-19 safe this year.

Eye-catching headlines abound in an attempt to make the most of our current situation;

"How to celebrate Valentine's Day 2021 in lockdown"

"Valentine's Day 2021: Date ideas during COVID-19"

"17 Quarantine Valentine's Day Ideas - Virtual Valentine's Day"

Like every other aspect of life since we first became aware of Cov-19, adaptation and innovation have come to the fore.

However, I'd like to think that perhaps in this of all years things might be a bit different. That society might be aware of a much wider understanding of love, one that reaches out to all.

That we would celebrate love not simply in a narrow insular and inward looking way, something secretly shared between two people, but rather love that is outward facing and all encompassing, that seeks to embrace all and in doing so reminds us that everyone is valued and special and important.

We recall how in the early days of the first lockdown there was a shift of perception towards those who had in the past been overlooked. Undervalued, hard working and low paid employees were at last being appreciated and valued in their roles as key workers and that those who had often been 'invisible' and taken for granted before, were now rightfully being thanked.

Christian Aid in a recent article talked about love equalling physical distancing plus social solidarity.

The word 'love' in the time of Covid–19 has become "the love of life: our own life, the life of others, the life and the well–being of everyone we know and those we do not know", Archbishop Michael Jackson.

This year, Valentine's Day falls on a Sunday, which is most apt - for as we all know it is love that is at the very heart of our faith and the message that we seek to share.

As St. Paul reminds us;

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.



THANK YOU We are very grateful to all who are supporting us in what is for everyone a very difficult time. Regular donations are especially helpful as we seek to meet a demand for help that is likely to be greater than ever in the coming months.

January 2021 Covid Impact.

2020 has been a year of serious ups and downs for FHN,a most serious "up" saw monthly applications reach nearly 200 in June, the continuing "down" being our income stream.

Normally in a year we would be out and about promoting the work of the Fund, at small church groups and services and bigger events such as Spring Harvest, Greenbelt and, of course, the Methodist Conference, and this contact with people is what helps with our income. Fortunately, a reduction in income was partly offset in the summer by our wonderful sponsored walkers and, more recently, new advertising in the Church Times.

The level of applications remains high. We have had several new organisations finding us each month, many of them desperate for ways to help clients where other sources have dried up.

Like most charities we have had a serious drop in income. As churches and other groups try to adapt, with meetings in different forms, we know many are wondering about their own financial future but can you help us to help the most desperate?

The need

November 2020.

Becky* was recently allocated a house in a new area after suffering domestic violence. However, there are no carpets, bed, furniture or oven/microwave. A community engagement worker has obtained bedding, a wardrobe, kitchen utensils and basic items, but we are mindful that she still can't move in to sleep without a bed. Becky is working with the step-up service who are taking steps to get her a job and gain more independence. She is willing to learn, return to work and access training.

We have issued bus tickets to help her get to the house to clean and decorate it, for which she shows strong motivation. We are also supporting her with information, advice and guidance. (* name changed)

After an emergency payment from FHN was made we received the following acknowledgement:

December 2020: I can confirm the cheque has arrived and we have managed to find a single bed discounted to £80. Becky asked that I pass on how delighted she was that you were able to help and she will now be ready to move to her home for Christmas. Kind regards, Senior Family Mentor, Groundwork.

Groundwork is a federation of charities mobilising practical community action on poverty and the environment across the UK.

The need

We work with many different organisations; 'Gilead' treat and counsel those battling with addictions in a residential setting where they can also retrain for employment. The cost of residence, treatment and training takes all of a client's benefits etc, so they apply to us for a payment to help fund small personal and hygiene items to boost self-esteem and foster self-reliance. We made such a payment (£80) to help this lady*:

'I have been battling with addiction to alcohol and prescription medication for over 10 years and have found it very challenging to come to terms with some deeprooted issues over those years.

The love and faithfulness of God never ceases to amaze me and he directed me here in May to a place where all you receive is love and kindness. I am truly grateful to be with these women, it is a very special place. I am working through the Process with my counsellor which is really digging up those roots and helping me realise some key things, which I believe will lead to the unlocking of the chains that have kept me bound for years. I now have a real passion for gardening and how therapeutic it can be and what a great source of wellbeing it is. I now have a hope for a good future." (* name withheld / changed)

Working with others

At the Fund for Human Need although we will accept personal applications it is preferable and, in some cases, necessary that an application is made through an organisation. These are charities, community groups, churches, housing associations and increasingly NHS trusts or local authorities. We now have a list of over 120 such organisation that we deal with, and applications from them accounted for over ¾ of our 2019/20 applications. These local experts know the clients and their situations well, how difficult things are and how everything is affecting them and their families. They are also in a position to get whatever it is the clients need once the funds are provided.

These organisations are working at the sharp end personally trying to help people in desperate circumstances with nowhere else to turn, often even their own systems cannot provide the type of individually tailored, flexible help we can as our small amounts of money can provide just what the individual / family needs.

The need

From an organisation helping those in the asylum system in the North.

B is a refused asylum seeker from Pakistan. He is homeless and sleeps rough on the streets. He suffers from severe anxiety and has been diagnosed with PTSD. His solicitor has tried to argue his case with the City council for financial support and accommodation on the basis of his mental health. There is very little 3rd sector support available during this pandemic because most charities are still closed. B is hoping to receive a positive decision from the city council, social services about some practical support but he doesn't know when he will hear back. B has requested some help to buy a warm winter coat, a sleeping bag and some healthy food to keep him going until he hears back from the adult social care, B doesn't have a mobile either, he can buy a £10/£15 basic mobile phone to stay in contact with his solicitor and support organisations. So much of what we do has changed in this last year - shops, schools, banks and not least of all, church. Many people and organisations have had to re-think what they do and how. We often think of faithfulness as continuing with something despite all obstacles and difficulties - and yes, that is often what faithfulness looks like. But when we continue with something that is no longer needed or relevant, our faithfulness can turn in to stubbornness, rigidity and blinkered vision.

Street Pastors has always been about meeting the needs of people in our communities whom we have often found to be unwell, upset, lost, confused, alone, in danger - and in many other ways! But life has changed and the people we used to meet are mostly now at home - possibly in similar or maybe worse situations. Don't worry, although we are not currently patrolling during lockdown, we are not about to pack up and go home ourselves - as Christians we must be ready to rethink what we do in order to continue to be relevant to those we seek to help. We are not sure when we will make it back on to the streets at night, but for now we must look at ways of helping those in need and continuing to recruit volunteers who can help us reach people, maybe in different ways and at different times. I am sure that things will continue to change in 2021, but in all this we know Him who does not change like shifting shadows, whose faithfulness reaches to the skies. Let's continue to seek Him in our daily lives to know how best to serve those in need. His compassions fail not... for great is His faithfulness! (Lamentations Ch 3 v 22-23)

Back where we belong ...but not for long

Since our October 2020 Quarterly News we patrolled 7 times in Wantage during the time when pubs were allowed to open to 11 pm. We were able to help one or two people and be a listening ear for several more, but we have not seen the numbers of people out and about that we are used to, and with such big changes to the night-time economy, there is a great deal less drunkenness on the streets - which is definitely a good thing, although, we're not quite sure what to do with that massive box of flip-flops in the cupboard! :-

As the nation entered another 'Stay-at-home' lockdown on Boxing Day, the Trustees decided that continuing night-time patrols throughout January was of little benefit and so it was decided to suspend night-time patrols for the time being. It's not that there are not needy people out and about, it's just that their needs are very different and they're not generally out and about in the cold and in the dark except to do some shopping for the essentials.

With this in mind, we would be very happy to patrol in day time hours, given sufficient Street Pastors' availability and we are exploring the possibility of online patrols! What? Yes, online patrols! We certainly wouldn't be the first Street Pastor area to go online to meet people and to continue to care, to listen and to help wherever we can.

Street Pastor Training on line

Several of our Street Pastors have dipped their toes into the wonderful world of online training, with courses such as Good News, Knowing Your Community and Listening Skills. The pilot scheme seems to be going well.

Sessions are live and interactive using the Zoom app, which allows for people to break away into small discussion groups as well as allowing the trainer to display Powerpoint presentations and videos.

One of our Street Pastors said that despite some technical issues, "...it was good to encounter a geographically wider cohort of street pastors with a wider variety of experiences!".

Interview with Carol Pask

Straight from the police station into the church – that was the route for Carol Pask in the early days of WGSP. Carol would finish her shift at midnight from working behind the bar at the police social club, then join the prayer support team at the base. Sadly due to back pain, Carol has had to retire from Street Pastors but assures us she will be back on prayer support when COVID allows. Carol is also one the few street pastors across the country who has patrolled with the aid of crutches, and latterly a rollator through two hip replacements. Marj Lunn chats to Carol to gain an insight into her inspirational commitment:

What made you decide to be a Street Pastor? I started out as a prayer support volunteer because I wasn't sure about doing all the training but after a few years I went out as an observer and I thought I'd give it a go. I've really enjoyed it and I'll miss it.

What did you enjoy about being a Street Pastor? People are really pleased to see us. The young people are really chatty and sometimes the older people not so much, but they get to know us. I've enjoyed meeting other prayer support volunteers, some of whom have moved away and I still keep in touch with.

What will you miss? I'll miss chatting to people and I'll miss our team – we had such a laugh together. We even had nicknames for each other. If you know, you know!

Tell us about one of the most memorable moments. Oh, there are so many... I remember a family coming out of the pub one night and physically fighting in the middle of the street. Then a car came along and ran in to them because they wouldn't move out of the way. The police came and sorted it all out.

What advice would you give to someone thinking of becoming a street pastor? You've got to want to do it. It can be tiring but once you're chatting to people, the time passes. Also, the training was quite straight forward in the end and I managed it without too much trouble.

Please continue to pray for the work going on to establish a school chaplain for Wantage and Grove. Pat Hudson writes:

My really, really urgent prayer request is for funding to establish a deanery schools chaplaincy. On behalf of the deanery sub-committee working on it, I've submitted three funding requests: one to the diocese, one to the Cowley Fathers and one to a Wantage KA charity; but even if all three are successful to the full amount requested, we are still £16K short.

The project will be joint deanery, CSMV, VAT and a few volunteers like me. It'll start in Wantage, Grove, Hanney and Challow church primaries, extend to all the primaries and secondaries so hopefully a real impact on the new secondary in Grove.

It's a three-year project in the first instance and should pull together all the voluntary people who work in schools and link the schools/their parish church and community.

- the funding for it to start this September while the school support is there
- the right applicants and the right appointment.

Jane Beckley has passed on some points for thanks and prayer.

Thanks

- We had very few cases before the latest lockdown.
- The few cases we did have were identified quickly and our own track and trace system meant those who needed to be were identified and asked to self-isolate quickly and the infection didn't spread.
- Systems for distancing and cleaning were all in place and well maintained.
- Live online lessons seem to be working well teachers are rapidly getting to grips with the technology and the options it offers, and most students seem able to access the lessons and the accompanying work.
- Key worker and vulnerable students are working in school in year group bubbles.
- Laptops, tablets and data "vouchers" have been supplied to lots of families either from school stock or, mostly, through "The Mix" and other generous local charities plus companies providing cards for data for mobile phones if that's been the issue.
- Testing protocols are in place ready for when we return and have been tried out on those working in school.

Prayer Requests

- The uncertainties and changing guidelines are difficult for all.
- The live online teaching isn't easy it's draining for teachers who have to adjust their resources and teaching styles and are getting to grips with how best to support students remotely; students (and families) are juggling resources at home and struggling to concentrate at times. Some students seem to be thriving in their own space, but others find it hard or have technical issues that disrupt the flow.
- The workload for students (and teachers) is tough. The Government legally require 5 hours of lessons per day. KAs have interpreted this to provide 4 live lessons each morning and independent tasks to follow on in the afternoon but it's very hard to judge how long tasks are taking each student and how they're coping with it all.
- Some still have technical issues (all have them at times!)
- Although some students are working in school there are still students who need support who are struggling at home (and falling behind)
- Pastoral care better provision this time but some will still slip through the net and be struggling.
- Exam groups great stress all round while we wait for details about how they will be assessed. (And this filters down to Y10 too, for example)
- Transition from primaries we have a plan in place for "remote" transition and it should be smoother than last year as we've already got resources and procedures in place and tested them last year, but it's still an anxious time for families and not ideal to be supporting them from a distance.

- Grove CE School

We still don't yet know when meeting together in person will be possible again. In normal times, we would next plan to meet late in April. For now, we will keep in touch by email, and hope to be able to meet to pray again before too long.

Church Council

Church Council met on Zoom on Thursday 6th February.

The meeting expressed its sympathy and sorrow at the recent death of Keith Underhill's father and thanks for the generosity of the legacy received from Pam Rose.

It was reminded that District Synod would be voting this spring on proposals from Conference consequent to the report "God in love unites us".

It agreed unanimously to provisional legislation regarding changes to the Model Trust to ease the restrictions on the use of Methodist premises by other Churches.

It received the annual reports regarding Data Protection (GDPR compliance), Annual Accounts, the Property Return and Safeguarding.

It agreed to donations from the General Fund and Benevolent Fund.

The need to open a separate bank account was noted and a small group were authorised to progress the matter.

Thanks were recorded to those members and friends who have continued to support the church, both financially and in other ways during the closure of the church buildings.

The issues with the West Boundary wall were noted. Thanks were expressed to Rob Charles for the work involved in progressing this.

The meeting agreed to progress the offer of a new home for the old pulpit lantern from West Challow Church and approved the potential use of our church premises as a Polling Station at the May local elections and on two Saturdays in June by the Wantage Music Festival (conditional on it being permitted).

There will be a Zoom service on Ash Wednesday and Keith is preparing material for study /discussion groups in Lent. Arrangements are being finalised for a zoom meeting with Michael Wadsworth to promote the "Methodist Way of Life".

The meeting confirmed the policy that the routine use of the premises is conditional on the Wantage area being below "CV19 Tier 2 (January 2021 definition)".

It was emphasised that the Church is live and working. Only our buildings are closed.
