

From the Manse.....

As I am writing the sun is shining, the sky is blue, the flowers are coming out, the grass has been cut and a starling is gathering twigs for its nest and playing tug-of-war with a solitary piece of string attached to the fence. The view from the study window proclaims that spring is here and vividly bears testimony to that fact.

Spring heralds the promise of all that is to come. It turns its back on winter and taunts the barrenness and desolation of the season that has just passed with signs of new life, new beginnings and resurrection.

That which had been dormant for so long and looked devoid of life is now transfigured and transformed with "buds of earth and flowers of heaven".

This spring more than any other for a long time, has been much sought after and longed for as we seek some respite from the all-encompassing pandemic that has physically and emotionally locked us down and forced us inside.

With warmer weather and spirits lifted by the bright skies, it feels as if we are now able to raise our collective faces towards the sun and in doing so, find some solace, space and freedom, albeit within the limitations placed upon us. The promise of better times to come and the feeling that this too will pass now seems more real, more believable.

The miracle of resurrection that is so clearly visible in our gardens, parks and fields, is a harbinger of that which is at the heart of our faith. It reminds us that out of death comes life, out darkness comes light, out of despair comes hope and out of captivity comes freedom.

Resurrection turns the old order upside down and inside out. It discards what was and turns it into something new.

Like Easter day itself, resurrection is not solely tied down to a specific time of year or date, for it is a reality that continually breaks into the world. We might recall, proclaim and focus on the resurrection story on one particular day of the year, (4th April in 2021) but it is about every moment of every day.

Whether we are talking about resurrection writ large with a capital R in matters of life and death, or resurrection in the more ordinary things that surround us - there are signs of its truth all around us.

Long after the Easter eggs have all been eaten, the flowers on the Lenten Cross taken down and the Easter cards recycled, we proclaim Christ is risen!

For when the warmth breaks through the cold and light comes to the dark places, Christ is risen!

When sadness turns to joy and fear turns to rejoicing,

Christ is risen!

When we take courage and share the good news,

Christ is risen!

When the shroud is left behind and the banner of Christ is unfurled,

Christ is risen!

He is risen indeed - Alleluia!


WGCP Family Walk for Easter

A Methodist Way of Life

You may well be asking, what is A Methodist Way of Life?

Well, a Methodist Way of Life is a way of living. It is how we try to live our lives in response to God's love, made known to us in Jesus. Like the early Christians (<u>Acts 2.42-47</u>), we seek to express what it means to follow Jesus in the regular, practical actions of worship, learning and caring, service and evangelism.

In this sense, A Methodist Way of Life is both new and old. It is new, in that Methodists first discussed such a way at the 2018 Conference, although it is based on **Our Calling**, agreed in 2000. That, in turn, was built on what Methodists have always done, since the days of John Wesley, in trying to follow Jesus and live out the Christian faith – just as those first followers in Acts did.

The **commitments** of A Methodist Way of Life remind us of, and provide a compass for, Christian living.

There will be an open Zoom meeting for anyone in the Circuit on **Wednesday 14**th **April** at 7:30 pm to find out more about this exciting new venture. The event will be led for us by Michael Wadsworth from the Methodist learning network.

Guided meditations

Rev Eileen Appleyard is a retired Methodist minister recently moved to live in Abingdon.

She is interested in Spirituality, and in the first lockdown she qualified to lead a meditation group under the auspices of a group called TakeTime (taketime.org.uk). It is what is described as a 'Fresh Expression' of the Methodist Church. This particular group itself is sponsored by All Saints Methodist Church Abingdon.

A first Introductory meditation Course has now come to an end and a follow-up has been arranged for the after Easter period. It will be using some of the Easter stories as the focus of what we do. There will be **five or six meetings** in this series beginning on the **15**th **April** at 7:30 pm on Zoom.

The meditation lasts about 40 minutes. The style of the group is centred around a time of quiet Ignatian style meditation in which we each have chance to imagine being with Jesus, based on a Gospel reading, and to have time in his presence to simply 'be' there.

Prior to the meditation itself there is a time of approach in which we are invited to relax and many find that also serves to quieten our minds of some of the clutter and worry we carry especially in these strange times. Each evening is complete in itself so it's OK to miss an occasional one if necessary.

Reflecting on the pandemic a year on

The Rev Richard Teal and Carolyn Lawrence, the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, have issued this message ahead of the anniversary of the first lockdown:

"The past year has asked much of us as individuals, families and communities. For many hundreds of thousands of us it has been a time of immense grief for the loss of loved ones. For others the economic uncertainty and restrictions on our day to day activities have taken a huge toll on mental wellbeing. Others may be living with the effects of long Covid not knowing how long it will last. We pray that this anniversary will be a time of deep reflection, prayer and a time to process all that has passed. We also mark a solemn time in Lent just ahead of Holy Week. As we begin the journey to the cross, let us take comfort in the knowledge that we are never alone, that Jesus is walking with us and that our hope lies in Him."

Statement from Church leaders on the UK Government announcement on warhead numbers

Church leaders across 7 denominations, including the Methodist Church, have today made the following statement following the publication of the Government's integrated review of foreign and defence policies:

"The Government's decision in the integrated review of defence, security and foreign policy to increase the number of Trident nuclear warheads the UK can stockpile by more than 40 percent is a retrograde step that will not make any of us safer.

"Our Trident submarines already carry warheads that in total have an explosive yield equivalent to hundreds of the bombs that were dropped on Hiroshima. It is immoral that the UK government is committing resources, which could be spent on the common good of our society, to stockpiling even more.

"Over the last 50 years, the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty has restricted the increase in the number of nuclear weapons worldwide as well as the number of new nuclear-armed states. This announcement puts those gains in jeopardy and weakens collective action on non-proliferation. Progress on reducing the threat from nuclear weapons will come through dialogue, diplomacy and principled action. The Government's announcement today will complicate rather than aid this process.

"The entry into force of the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons is an encouraging development. As people of faith, we join with millions across the world who are working towards the elimination of nuclear arsenals. Living up to our responsibilities under the Non Proliferation Treaty would be a step towards realising that vision. We believe that 'Global Britain' should strive for peaceful and cooperative international relationships, and joint endeavour on climate change, global poverty and other challenges. This announcement takes us in a worrying and wholly wrong direction."

Where next?

We are still expecting to start having services in chapel from **Pentecost**, **May 23**rd. Details of what the arrangements will be will not be finalized until after the Annual Church Meeting, by which time we expect to have a clearer view of national progress.

When this Newsletter is published, we will be nearing the completion of our journey through Lent, and the time when we set our clocks to British Summer Time, with all of the joyful anticipation of what that season brings. We will have had a year in which each day's news has included references and statistics relating to the Coronavirus. So much of what we have experienced in the last twelve months has been unfamiliar, unwelcome, and unrelenting. We reflect with sadness on the members of our church family whom we have lost, and we continue to feel deep concern for those whose health is not good, or who are facing individual struggles of different kinds. Without our faith, and without God's love and support endlessly holding and caring for us, the past year would have been infinitely more difficult, and our anticipation of the year ahead would generate doubts, anxieties and fears. Thankfully, we know that we can rely totally on God's promises to be alongside us every day, and our pastoral care for each other is one of the surest ways in which we can reflect his love for each one of us. Maybe we are not too far off being able to visit each other in person, in our homes and gardens, in hospitals and Care Homes, and how much we will appreciate that direct contact with each other again. Throughout all of the restrictions of lockdown, through to a complete lifting of each one of them, nothing has compromised the limitless prayer support we have been able to offer, and we thank God for the comfort, encouragement and reassurance which our prayers have provided.

Sadly, on 5th March Kay Goodwin's husband Jack died. He had been unwell for a while and was resident in the Sanctuary Nursing Home since last October. We assure Kay, her daughter Lorna, her son Murray and all of the family that we are thinking of them and praying for them in their sadness.

Pam Martin's recovery from her fall last December was progressing until a few weeks ago when, unfortunately, she was admitted to the JR Hospital again, and has undergone two major operations on her brain. This has caused deep concern, particularly for Gill and Tim, through whom we have remained updated on Pam's condition. It was a great encouragement and joy today when Pam herself telephoned. She anticipates being transferred to a Community Hospital for a period of recovery and rehabilitation – maybe to Witney again? Being invited to just peep into her living room for a moment, a wonderful array of cards, flowers, and plants was displayed, and so, despite all of the current social restrictions, Hilary was delighted by the thoughtfulness shown to her, and she asked me to pass on her sincere thanks to all of her kind friends from church
