#### From the Manse.....

By fine margins and in the most cruel of fashions, the England Men's Football Team narrowly missed out on winning the Euro 2020 Championship. Nevertheless, they still managed to bring football home.

In a dignified and humble way, they restored not only our love for what is so often referred to as the 'beautiful game' but also reflected the values and compassion of our nation that have so often been conspicuous by their absence in recent years.

The whole squad reminded us of what is really important and what really matters. Young men from varied backgrounds and experiences, of differing ethnicities and cultures standing as one, reflecting the glorious make up that is modern England. In them we saw what could and should be, and recognised the clarion call for us all to be the best version of ourselves.

Just as on the pitch, so, too, off it. Time and time again they have stood up against racism, oppression and injustice. They have spoken with openness, honesty, integrity and feeling. They have told their stories and, in doing so, given a voice to so many who for so long thought that nobody understood or knew them.

They have shown true leadership with their words matching their actions and their support of those in need.

The abuse that so many of them have received in the past and to which they were subjected after the penalty shootout is as blasphemous as it is unacceptable and wrong.

After the final, an M.P. publicly wondered if perhaps a certain player should practise taking penalty kicks more instead of playing politics. Other people have suggested that there is no place for politics in sport.

Perhaps a better question to ask is what has happened to us as a nation when it takes the efforts of a young professional footballer to change a government's mind to ensure children do not go to bed hungry.

The church too has so often been criticised for being involved in politics, of sticking its collective nose where it does not belong. It was the late <u>Helder Câmara</u>, one of the most distinguished Catholic Church leaders of the last century who said; "When I feed the poor they call me a saint. When I ask why so many people are poor they call me a communist."

Our calling, mission, discipleship and witness means that we cannot and must not be silent in the face of wrong-doing, that we are to be a voice for those who find themselves silenced and a light for those who find themselves in darkness.

To the England football team - "Thank you" and we too stand alongside you against the evils of racism, prejudice and injustice.

#### Conference confirms resolutions on marriage and relationships

Following prayerful consideration by the whole Church, the Methodist Conference has voted to confirm provisional resolutions on the principles or qualities of good relating, understanding of cohabitation and same sex marriages conducted on Methodist premises or by Methodist office-holders.

A report on marriage and relationships, 'God in Love Unites Us', was received by the Conference in 2019 and the local District Synods were asked to consider



the provisional resolutions and report back to this year's Conference which is being held this week in Birmingham. The Conference received a report on the results of the local conferring which showed that 29 out of the 30 Synods confirmed support for the provisional resolutions.

The Revd Sonia Hicks, President of the Conference, prayed ahead of the main debate on Wednesday morning in Birmingham, asking that the Conference's "words may be imbibed with your grace, with tenderness from on high."

A range of views were expressed on the resolutions, in particular on cohabitation and same sex marriages. The Revd Dr Jonathan Hustler, spoke to the Conference acknowledging the "depth of feeling, pain and anxiety that there is" with a commitment to work across the Connexion with District Chairs to heal divisions.

Speakers called for unity going ahead irrespective of the decision. Other speakers spoke of the acceptance of diversity that younger Church members have for each other with younger speakers relating their own lived experience as Christians from the LGBTQI+ community. Another representative asked that the Church does not ostracise those who oppose the introduction of same-sex marriages in the Church, saying the great majority of these people are trying to be faithful to Scripture as they see it.

The Methodist Church included other denominations and Methodist Churches across the world in the process of listening and consultation, with written submissions from ecumenical partners to the 'God In Love Unites Us' report and workshops with global Methodist partners.

Following the vote on the provisional resolutions the Revd Sonia Hicks said: "The debate today and our wider conversation has been conducted with grace and mutual respect. As we move forward together after this historic day for our Church, we must remember to continue to hold each other in prayer, and to support each other respecting our differences."

#### Pastoral letter from the President and Vice President of the Conference

1 July 2021

**Dear Friends** 

We wished to take this opportunity to write to you after the Conference voted on the resolutions contained in the marriage and relationships report.

We very much appreciate that these decisions will stir up many different emotions for our siblings across the Connexion. There will be some who will be deeply hurt and others who will rejoice by what has been decided.

Our Presidential theme this year is God's Table: An Invitation for All, and God's invitation is for every single one of us. The Methodist Church has held tension for many years and as a Church and a family, we must do all we can to live with contradictory convictions.

This work was first reflected on back in 1992 and we have been on this journey together since that point. During the past years we have continued to listen to and to pray for each other and remaining true to what God is saying to us. We must remember in all this, to continue to hold each other in prayer, and to support each other as we find a way forward, respecting our differences.

It is perhaps helpful to remember that there are other issues, some of them discussed at the Conference, on which we hold differing and sometimes strong opinions. We live with them and we do not allow them to impair our communion with each other. We respect each other's consciences, we exercise judgment in when to speak and when to be silent, and we hold one another in prayer. We do all this not for our own sake but for the sake of Christ and the sake of the world which urgently needs to know the power of Christ's reconciling love.

Our prayer for you, beloved siblings, is that in joy or sorrow, in pain or excitement, we might continue to live within that reconciling love.

#### Methodist Connexional Coronavirus Guidance for Property - 13 July 2021

#### Changes to Government Guidance

• One of the aims of the latest government communiqué is to **enable the public to make informed decisions.** We are keen ministers and leadership teams do likewise. We offer these guidelines to help you, and your leadership teams, make decisions linked to your local context.

• The Property Team will be reviewing more detailed Connexional guidance following the Prime Minister's update on the 12 July, and posting this from 19 July, when the Government will lift most restrictions.

• Although there are no specific updates to the government guidance document concerning places of worship yet, the Health Secretary announced to the House of Commons that from the 19 July there will be '...no restrictions on communal worship and singing'. This includes singing at weddings, funerals and baptisms.

## What will the lifting of restrictions mean for churches and communal worship?

When government restrictions are removed, the emphasis will be on 'personal responsibility.' Currently, the Government is indicating that this will mean:

• No maximum numbers for meeting in any indoor or outdoor environments, including removing restrictions on group sizes attending communal worship.

- Communal singing can resume.
- All venues currently closed will be allowed to open.
- No restrictions on weddings, funerals or baptisms.
- No requirement for Covid-19 vaccination status certification to enter a venue.

• No legal requirement to wear a face covering, although it will be 'advised' for enclosed and crowded spaces.

• No social distancing rules, although the risks to those deemed vulnerable need to be considered.

- No need for 'Covid-secure' environments.
- Encouragement to continue good cleaning and hygiene procedures.

#### What does the Methodist Church advise?

The Methodist Church, whilst always adhering to government advice, is urging some caution for the sake of others in the church, community and for self-care.

Unfortunately, the Ghanaian Health Service falls drastically short of our NHS provision. In addition, Sharon prepares food which her children take to their father each morning, and, because of Covid, they must complete this errand by 5 am to be off the hospital site before the medical staff arrive. Sharon herself has just tested positive for Covid and so cannot visit her husband, but she is assured of our love and our prayers, and is so grateful for all the support which she trusts us to maintain.
