From the Manse.....

If you haven't seen it already, then I do urge you to go and visit the postbox that is opposite Wantage Mill on the grass area close to the brook.

There you will find sitting on top of the post box a magnificent knitted head of a First World War soldier.

It is both breathtaking and moving, powerful and poignant and the attention to detail is incredible, it is a real labour of love and dedication.

The label attached to this masterpiece (which has a red poppy and the words "lest we forget" on it) says; "This is William. William stands for all heroes - alive and fallen"

On Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday we will indeed "remember them" We will remember 'William' and the names of all those who gave their lives, all those who went off to fight and who never came back



those who went off to fight and who never came back, or, if they did, were never the same again.

It is important that we remember their names; names carved and inscribed on cenotaphs, crosses, monuments and cairns. We remember them by name and not simply as a number or statistic, for behind each name was a real person, loved and known.

I remember going to see the war graves in Flanders with a group of sixth form students as part of their First World War Poets module. The organiser of the trip had done his research and given each of us the name of a fallen soldier so that we could go and find their grave. The surname of that soldier was the same as our own. We were asked to find their resting place, to touch the stone and, if we wanted, to say a prayer. We were reminded that we could be the only person to have visited that grave for a long time, if ever.

When visiting the Tutankhamen exhibition last year I was reminded how in Ancient Egypt there was the belief that you die twice. Once, when you take your final breath, and then again the last time someone says your name. They believed that the spirits of the departed lived on for as long as people kept remembering them and their names were said.

In Isaiah 49, we are reminded that God has our name inscribed on the palm of his hand. We, like William and all those we remember lest we forget, are held by God, now and into eternity itself.

Wantage & Grove Street Pastors Report of our August & September 2021 activities

We patrolled seven times during August and September.

Some patrols have been quieter than we are used to but, even when it's quiet, we usually find someone who needs a little help - whether a bottle of water, or time spent listening and encouraging.

We are back patrolling in Grove and have found it to be quiet and peaceful. We visit several locations including the skate park and kebab van, Savile Way shops, Millbrook Square, Old Mill Hall, The Bay Tree pub and The Bell pub.

At the beginning of one of our patrols in Wantage, we met three young ladies. One was particularly drunk and felt sick. We spent some time with them, gave water and flip-flops and chatted for a while to make sure they were ok. Not long after, we met the same girl walking home with her boyfriend.

On a fairly quiet patrol in Wantage we saw a small group of guys discussing how they might climb up King Alfred's statue in the Market Place. We approached them and got chatting in an attempt to distract or dissuade them from climbing the statue. We recognised one of the men who told us how Street Pastors had often given him lollies and flip-flops in the past. He talked about how his life has changed and that he now has a good relationship with his family and has got his addictions under control. ... and they didn't climb the statue after all.

A number of our teams patrol slightly earlier in the evening and visit the Sweatbox Youth Centre whenever they can. One Friday night in September was buzzing with about 130 youngsters there. We spent some time chatting with the young people and staff, and handed out a few lollies before heading in to town for the rest of our patrol.

It is a great delight to be able to be back in church for worship, and to see that numbers have grown a little from our initial few services. It is lovely that people are now able to join in spoken responses, and even better to hear people singing, albeit quietly behind their masks – and that's not just because I have a chance of identifying which verse I am playing in a long hymn!

I feel very safe in the environment. We are now able to mingle a little more, but everyone is very respectful of other people, ensuring others' safety as well as their own.

I am delighted to see friends in person rather than on Zoom, although I was very grateful that we were (and still are) able to meet that way when nothing else was possible.

I look forward to the time when we can again sing in lusty Methodist fashion and are able to enjoy more fellowship after the services, with perhaps the odd lunch thrown in, but for the moment I accept things as they are.

My one true regret is the number of people who have not yet returned. I fully respect that people have their own very legitimate reasons for choosing not to come, but, much as I love seeing our more elderly members there, I really miss the middle and younger age groups, which give our church that sense of all-age unity.

If your reason is that you fear bringing contamination because you are working in the community during the week, don't worry. There is lots of room in church for social distancing. The balcony is almost empty and can accommodate lots of people safely.

If your reason (with which I can fully identify!) is that it's easier to fall out of bed at 10:15 and log on to your computer, or that you can do other things in the morning and still "get to church", please understand that we are missing you, and the church is a poorer place for your absence.

Here's to the future! – to a church that has learnt how to do things differently to the benefit of many, and to a church that can grow back into a physical as well as a virtual reality and be a welcoming place for all.

Times shared in his company were never dull, and always memorable, as Geoffrey was an amazing person who had an impact on the lives of everyone who knew him. It's not possible to give more than a hint of his life, his personality and his achievements in our newsletter, but hopefully there will be a fuller opportunity of sharing more at Geoffrey's funeral, which will also be a celebration of thanksgiving for his life. Accounts of his achievements during his career, and much travelled working life, in themselves describe a life of service inspired by his Christian faith, and give an insight into more aspects of the character of this remarkable man.

The knowledge which he held was as vast in its breadth as its depth, and was imparted with such humour, expression and perfect articulation, that no-one could fail to learn from such a scholar. In the same manner his generous compliments to others were delivered with such impeccable courtesy, everyone on the receiving end felt uplifted by his kind words.

As a proud Moravian, Geoffrey chose never to formally transfer to Methodism. Nevertheless, he was well known, respected and admired within our church family over a long period of time. We're all the richer for having known him, and there's so much about his unique personality which we will all miss.

We hold Geoffrey's daughters, Maggie, Diana, Lizza and Abigail and their families in our prayers. Similarly, we pray too for the group of church friends to whom he gave, and from whom he received, the joys of a deep friendship. Alison, Gill and Gordon, Jane and Carolyn all enjoyed being with Geoffrey for many years, and supported him lovingly to the very end of his life. May God's comfort and love surround them all, and may the knowledge that Geoffrey is at eternal rest strengthen all of them through this time of loss.

His funeral will be on **Monday 22nd November** at 1:00 pm at Wantage Methodist Church with overflow seating in the Hall and will also be accessible on Zoom. Please contact Keith or Gordon for access details.

Advent study for 2021

This year we hope to meet in person for Advent study groups, but there will also be a zoom group on offer. In the case of renewed restrictions this could also be an alternative way to study, but hopefully we shall make it to Christmas in person this year! Groups will meet weekly for four weeks, dates and times will follow.

Eileen's group who meet in the chapel on Tuesday afternoons will be using the Bible Reading Fellowship material called **Journeying through Advent**. Alison Phillips will also run a group using the same material, and will either meet in the chapel on Thursday mornings, or share with Eileen on Tuesdays depending on numbers. Depending on your requests, there can be a Zoom group which will use the same material, which Gordon will run.

The important thing is to let either Eileen or Alison Phillips know if you are interested in either in person groups or Zoom so that we know how many booklets we will need to buy. They cost £2.99 each and we shall run the first Advent session in the week beginning November 22nd.

There will be daily readings and a reflection to read in advance of each week, so it would be very helpful if you could **let Eileen or Alison know by November 10th** if you would like to join any group, so that we can order the booklets in time for you to begin reading during the week beginning November 15th.

This all sounds very early to be getting ready for Christmas, but putting some time aside each day to reflect on God's word keeps the hustle and bustle of daily life in perspective, and a chance to prepare for God's greatest gift, His son Jesus being born into our world.

Bible Reading Notes [IBRA]

Each Year the International Bible Reading Association produces notes to help people read the Bible on a regular basis. This Year the Title is called **Fresh From The Word** for 2022 with foreword by Rev Dr Ash Barker.

A world hungry for good news and for assurances of a better future can find these and so much more in His Word. Journey through the year in the company of Christians across the globe in these daily Bible readings with supporting notes, prayers, and thought-provoking questions from dozens of contributors from different walks of life. Each writer brings their own experience of God and His Word, refined through the reality of the worldwide pandemic, to shed new light on familiar themes: facing despair and fear, being Church, living with pain whilst sustained by hope, how we regard the stranger, how we love our neighbour.
