From the Manse.....

As I begin to take the first part of my postponed Sabbatical, looking at and being on pilgrimage, many of the nativity passages within Matthew and Luke Gospels have a poignant resonance this year, for both walking and journeying feature heavily in the narratives that are so very familiar.

A young betrothed couple travelling from Nazareth to Bethlehem in order to be registered and star gazers from the east, searching for and following a star. Then of course, the flight and escape to Egypt of Mary, Joseph and their new born son.

Even with the help and use of a donkey and camels (none of which are mentioned in the texts) those who feature in these much loved passages would have been on foot for quite a lot of the time.

In the Old Testament, three characters are specifically mentioned as being those who "walked with God". One is Noah; Brownie points to those who can name the other two!

There is something significant about walking that helps to root us in the reality of the world and of everyday life. Journeying at a walking pace, allows us to take in our surroundings and to appreciate the views that are before us and all that which we so often readily ignore or take for granted.

Walking, by its very nature, is not fast and there is something about the pace at which you travel that is important.

We often speak of our own journey through Advent towards Christmas and as we follow in the footsteps of those who are part and parcel of the Christmas story, may we be aware that, like all pilgrims, we tread on holy and hallowed ground; our feet touching the earth upon which those who have gone before us have trod.

As together and on our own, we travel towards Bethlehem once more, I wish you all a peaceful and blessed Advent and Christmas

Wantage & Grove Street Pastors Quarterly News



Hello! I am Paul Gander and together with my family (my wife Francesca and three children) I moved to Wantage in August to be Pastor and Community Development Lead for Wantage Community Church. As part of that role I will be the new Chair of the trustees for Wantage and Grove Street Pastors. I was approached in the spring to see if I would be interested in taking on the role of chair and after a time of prayer and seeking God, I felt it was right to put myself forward and fortunately the trustees all said yes! I have worked in the community for the last 18 years, first as a youth worker and more recently in my role at Kings Church where I led the community development work. As part of my youth work job I spent 13 years on the streets of Didcot doing detached youth work, which I found was a wonderful privilege to serve the young people of the town. This background therefore gave myself a real heart for the role of Street Pastors and what it does for Wantage and Grove. I hope and pray that I will be able to serve the charity and the town in this role over the coming months and years. When I am not working or with the family, I enjoy watching most sports or getting out and walking through the countryside.

I have heard so many great things about the street pastors and I look forward to hearing more stories of the great work God is doing through the street pastors.

How we helped on the Streets

We achieved twelve patrols since our July edition of Quarterly News - five patrols in July, four in August and three in September. We were unable to patrol on three occasions. With no 'slack in the system', it is more difficult to fix problems when they arise. If we are unable to replace a Street Pastor who has had to drop out for some reason, then the patrol cannot go ahead.

We are pleased to report that we are no longer seeing large groups gathering in Wantage. There were a number of smaller aggressive situations that we were able to help calm down, including preventing two groups of people from aggravating each other. At the end of one of our patrols we were standing outside a pub when a lady frantically rushed back to the pub, hoping to get in and saying that she had lost her mobile phone. We offered to call her number and found that her phone was in her pocket all the time! The poor lady was very apologetic – and a little embarrassed!

Patrols in Grove have been quiet. We visit several locations including the skate park and kebab van, Savile Way shops, Millbrook Square, Old Mill Hall, The Bay Tree pub and The Bell pub.

In Wantage, as well as spending time in the Market Square, we also visit Betjeman Park, the Undercroft Car Park, Manor Park and from time to time the cemetery. Our earlier patrol visits Sweatbox and spends time with the staff and young people.

Now is the time!

Yes, that's right - now is the time! Now is the time to sign up for Street Pastor roles in Wantage & Grove Street Pastors! ...and there are plenty of options available to you because we're always looking to expand what we do:

Night time economy patrols - caring for people who are out at night on Friday and Saturday nights ('early' and late night patrols)

Daytime or afternoon patrols - caring for people who are in town in the daytime, especially children and young people who may be vulnerable or a target for 'county lines' criminals after school.

Online patrols as "Screen Pastors" - caring for people who are online by providing a safe space for people to talk about their lives

Now is the time to apply for these roles because we will be hosting the all important *Roles & Responsibilities* training course in the new year. This 1-day course is mandatory for all Street Pastor roles and forms the basis for further training.

2021 AGM

Our AGM was held on 5 October 2021. Members accepted the annual report and accounts for 2020/21. Trustees were re-elected and Paul Gander was elected as a trustee and appointed as our new Chair. Following the formal AGM, our Coordinator, Nigel Watt gave an update on patrols and operational issues. Pete Beckley asked the question, "*As a Street Pastor I observe that there has been a noticeable decrease in opportunities to assist and interact with people on Saturday nights. Can WGSP make changes to remain relevant in our community?*" This led to a very useful discussion about how people's behaviour has changed since lockdown with pubs closing earlier and the effect of currently not having a nightclub in town. Several ideas of how we can remain relevant were suggested, including support for daytime and online patrols. Other ideas were suggested including observing the night-time economy to see where problems lie, working with local schools in lesson provision and connecting with Be Space as they seek to provide prayer spaces in schools and in the community.

Remaining relevant to the needs of Wantage and Grove will be key to our success.

Farewell PC Darren James

We are sorry to have to say 'farewell' to PC Darren James as he leaves the Wantage Neighbourhood Police Team to take up a post at the Thames Valley Police Control Room in Abingdon. Darren joined the team in Wantage nearly 23 years ago and has worked tirelessly, not only tackling and solving crime locally, but he has been dedicated to building relationships in the community and helping to keep people safe. Darren was awarded Community Officer of the Year in 2018 for his contribution to local policing - an award for which he was nominated by members of the public. Not only do we see Darren on the streets at night while we're patrolling, but also at the Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) - a group whose purpose is to identify issues in the local community and to take action towards resolving problems wherever possible. We are very grateful for all the support we receive from the police and so we will certainly miss Darren. Well done on the new job Darren, and best wishes for the future from all of us at Wantage & Grove Street Pastors.

JPIT - THE GLASGOW COP26 SUMMIT BRIEFING

What we need and what we got

In November 2021, the COP26 Summit agreed the Glasgow Climate Pact. In this brief analysis we assess the Glasgow summit's achievements against the yardstick of what is necessary if we are to avoid exceeding 1.5 degrees of warming.

KEEPING 1.5 DEGREES ALIVE

Background

Following COP21 in Paris, the ambition of almost all governments (including the UK) was limited to keeping warming 'well below 2 degrees'. In 2015, most governments were not ready to increase their commitments to contribute to the higher ambition of 1.5 degrees.

What we need

We need unequivocal acceptance that every State Party will base targets on the contribution of their nation state to a 1.5 degree goal. This requires substantial near term action between now and 2030.

What we got at COP26

The Glasgow Climate Pact repeats the text of the Paris agreement on 2 degrees and 1.5. The Pact states separately that it "resolves to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 degrees". However, we do not yet have any basis for a formula that could tie commitments on the part of developed nations for further provision of climate finance, to improved national contributions that would be compatible with 1.5 degrees.

PLEDGES ON REDUCTIONS IN CARBON EMISSIONS

Background

Governments were required to submit Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) to emission reductions by 2020 and most have done so.

What we need

Prior to COP26 the sum total of NDC's was roughly consistent with 2.7 degrees of global warming, not 1.5 degrees. We need States to urgently pledge action which to close this gap.

What we got at COP26

The new pledges improve the position a bit, and are now consistent with 2.4 degrees of warming. However, State Parties have been asked to revisit and strengthen the 2030 targets in their Nationally Determined Contributions by the end of 2022. The COP secretariat has been mandated to report the state of play on total pledges every year. The previous expectation that pledges only need be updated every five years has been scrapped reflecting a greater sense of urgency.

CLIMATE FINANCE

Background

In 2009, it was agreed that climate finance funding of \$100bn a year would be made available by 2020. By 2019 \$80bn of climate finance had been made available. The fund supports developing countries in mitigation and adaptation to climate change.

What we need

Meeting, and then surpassing, the \$100bn pledge is critical to ensure that developing countries receive the necessary support to achieve further mitigation actions. In reality, a lot more than \$100bn will be required.

What we got at COP26

The Glasgow Climate Pact “Notes with deep regret that the goal of developed country Parties to mobilize jointly USD 100 billion per year by 2020 ... has not yet been met”. The \$100bn pledge will be reached by 2023 or sooner.

The Pact “urges developed country Parties to at least double their collective provision of climate finance for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025”.

LOSS AND DAMAGE

Background

Extreme weather events such as floods, storms, droughts, and wildfires are becoming more frequent and severe every year. This leads to loss of homes, infrastructure, cultural heritage and livelihoods. When major disasters hit developing countries they can overwhelm the national capacity to rebuild.

What we need

Past COPs have resisted detailed discussion of loss and damage, or consideration of separate funding mechanism to address loss and damage. Along with our partners at Faith for the Climate we have called for new a fund based on needs, which we expect requires at least \$75bn/year.

What we got at COP26

There will be a push next year at COP27 for the implementation of the framework for managing loss and damage funding (the implementation of the Santiago Network).

Worryingly, the United States in particular seemed to be resisting the creation of a new funding stream.

STATE PARTIES' ACCOUNTABILITY AND REPORTING

Many governments make big promises on carbon emissions and then hope to employ various forms of double-counting and offsets in order to slash the actual cuts in domestic emissions that they will need to report. The Paris Agreement did not attempt to set out the rules for accounting for emissions and these were to be determined at COP26.

What we need

No possibility of double-counting credits for emissions generated in one country and bought in another. An agreement not to bring forward large amounts of historic Kyoto-protocol credits into the new post-2020 system. A percentage of the value of new carbon credits purchased by companies should be directed towards funding adaptation for developing countries.

What we got at COP26

Reasonably sound rules to ensure no double counting were set, the carry forward of Kyoto-protocol credits was strictly limited and 5% of the value of carbon credits will be directed towards funding adaptation.

IN CONCLUSION

We now have a framework for developing carbon markets. If the market for carbon can overcome the previous inadequacies, this could galvanise private sector investment in transition. Mark Carney, UN special envoy on climate action and finance, has spoken of a potential \$130 trillion of private finance in capital markets that can be re-purposed towards green industries. Even though this is almost certainly an optimistic estimate it demonstrates that the potential of private funding is large.

The picture around government-sourced multilateral funding for developing countries is less positive. Countries that are on the forefront of the climate crisis, such as small island states, have come away from COP26 feeling marginalised in the negotiations and it appears that their appeals for urgent funding for mitigation, adaptation and loss and damage have not yet been heard.

Eco Church

Churches complete the unique online Eco Survey about how they are caring for God's earth in different areas of their life and work. The answers a church provides will collect points towards an Eco Church Award – the more a church does, the more points it gets!

The survey takes the church through five key areas of its life:

- Worship and teaching
- Management of church buildings
- Management of church land
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle

Prayer is an important part of our meeting and we spend time each week praying for people and situations near and far. If you have someone or a situation you would like us to pray for please let me know.


We still continue to socially distance, wear masks and ventilate the space when we meet. Safety for all is a priority.
