However, the truth of Christmas tells us that, even so, we are not alone and that the Christ child is with us, whilst the glory of Easter and resurrection tells us that the Christ light has never been and never will be extinguished by the darkness of the world.

# Ukraine

### Statement on Ukraine from the Methodist Presidency

We are horrified and heartbroken as we witness the violent assault on Ukraine by the Russian military. This devastating action and ensuing loss of life have rightly been condemned across the world. It is a very clear violation of the UN Charter and as such imperils the foundation upon which international security is built and on which we all depend. We regret the failure to build an understanding with Russia and we pray for the Ukrainian and Russian peoples, including the Methodist church leaders in the region and the Methodist communities across Ukraine. Christians are called to 'pursue peace with everyone' (Hebrews 12:14); this mandate is clear and requires courage, perseverance and understanding. We ask you to pray for all politicians, that there may be an to end to aggression and that dialogue, justice and peace may be established.

#### Refugee access to the UK - guests and hosts in the Wantage area

At Wantage Church Council, we launched a discussion about the plight of Ukrainian refugees, the willingness to welcome and host even those without family ties in the UK and the slow, inhuman UK response.

In an attempt to persuade the government to simplify and speed up the granting of visas, we decided that the most direct way of doing this would be to **lobby David Johnston, the local MP**. <u>david.johnston.mp@parliament.uk</u>

In the meantime, there have been promising developments, though there are still many unknowns about the new sponsorship scheme and concerns remain about possible bureaucratic delays and practical hindrances to the vulnerable refugees who are in such need.

We suspect that many other groups around the country, and possibly nearby, are probably having similar discussions, and that some might be well ahead of us, especially if they have pre-existing contacts with Ukraine. We are therefore reaching out to you, not necessarily as possible hosts (though we recognise some of you may be considering it), but as someone who might be well connected in one or more sectors of our local community, or might be experienced in supporting refugees, or might be involved in local voluntary activities.

The situation is obviously extremely fluid and we recognise the need to be adaptable but, at the moment, our aims for Wantage and the surrounding area would be:

- to set up / join a self-support group of potential hosts who can share experience on issues they experience (and explore the possibility of group sponsorship, should that emerge as a possible viable option) and expedite the process (including finding and pairing with guests; advise on DBS requirements)
- to set up (or join) a broader support group for hosts, helping them navigate the process of volunteering and welcoming guests
- to set up / join a support group(s) for Ukrainian guests, helping them navigate the practicalities of setting up a new (hopefully temporary) life in a foreign country and culture, which might include issues such as:

- accessing nurseries and schooling (with possible provision of a dedicated nursery in early months)
- accessing a "youth group" for Ukrainian children to meet with each other (with/without local children)
- support for parents (mothers) who wish to work
- to monitor progress and difficulties which can be fed back to local and national government to ensure urgent implementation of the humanitarian response

#### International Women's Day

International Women's Day (8 March) is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating women's equality.

This year's theme for International Women's Day 2022 was #BreakTheBias. Whether conscious or not, we are responsible for our own thoughts and actions and, through these, we can break the bias in our communities, workplaces, and education systems.

Gloria Steinem, world-renowned feminist, journalist, and activist once explained "The story of women's struggle for equality belongs to no single feminist, nor to any one organization, but to the collective efforts of all who care about human rights."

I've always been passionate about women's equality and working at All We Can has only amplified this. 'Intersectionality' is a term coined by law professor and civil rights advocate Dr Kimberlé Crenshaw. It helps us to explore the dynamic between coexisting identities and connected systems of oppression.

All We Can endeavours to see every person's potential fulfilled regardless of gender, however, the interconnectedness of all issues of injustice cannot be ignored and it is often women that are worst affected by poverty. Kimberlé Crenshaw explains, 'This idea that we all have the same life is false, race, class, gender come together to shape the life chances of people in very different ways.' It is also true that humanitarian crises, resulting from natural disasters or wars, deepen and aggravate the inequities of the patriarchal system in place.

It is easy to feel helpless when you hear about all of the injustice in the world, but there are some easy ways you can promote gender equality this International Women's Day and beyond:

Raise Your Voice – Have conversations with friends and family about inequality and call people out if they make ill-informed comments.

Support Female Creators – Buy a book, film, or piece of art from a female smallbusiness owner, author, director, or artist.

Volunteer or Fundraise – Support charities that promote women's equality.

The Zubo Trust, one of our incredible partners in Zimbabwe, exists to open opportunities for women. Working in the Binga District of Matabeleland North, they promote and support the needs of rural women in the Zambezi Valley to realise their full socio-economic potential. The Zubo Trust encourages women to make the most of naturally available resources which also benefits children, men, and the wider community around them.

Rebecca is part of Buniswa women's co-operative which hand-makes traditional woven baskets from the Ilala palm tree. This project, supported in partnership with All We Can, aims to give women an alternative source of income to provide them with more financial stability- which is at the heart of our partnership approach. All We Can walks together alongside talented local organisations, like the Zubo Trust, to ensure that communities become stronger through our collaboration with them.

#### A pandemic of injustice

H.E. Samia Suluhu Hassan, President of Tanzania; Prince Harry and Meghan, The Duke and Duchess of Sussex; Ban Ki-Moon; and Charlize Theron join plea for a People's Vaccine

More than 130 former world leaders, Nobel laureates, leading scientists, economists, humanitarians, faith leaders, business leaders, trade unionists, and celebrities are calling for urgent action to vaccinate low and middle-income countries and bring an end to the COVID-19 pandemic, in a letter coordinated by the People's Vaccine Alliance.

Condemning the approach of world leaders so far as "immoral, entirely self-defeating and also an ethical, economic and epidemiological failure", they warn that leaving billions of people unvaccinated risks leading to dangerous new variants COVID-19.

Failure to vaccinate the world so far is down to "self-defeating nationalism, pharmaceutical monopolies and inequality", the leaders say, which have led to the "avoidable" milestones of two years and an estimated twenty million deaths from COVID-19.

The letter puts five demands to world leaders:

1. Urgently agree and implement a global roadmap to deliver the WHO goal of fully vaccinating 70% of people by mid-2022, and beyond this ensure sustained, timely and equitable access worldwide to COVID-19 vaccines, treatments, tests and other medical technologies, including next generations effective and safe COVID-19 vaccines and medical technologies.

2. Maximise the production of safe and effective vaccines and other COVID-19 products by suspending relevant intellectual property rules and ensuring the mandatory pooling of all COVID-19 related knowledge, data and technologies so that any nation can produce or buy sufficient and affordable doses of vaccines, treatments and tests.

3. Invest public funding now in a rapid and massive increase in vaccine manufacturing as well as research and development (R&D) capacity to build a global distributed network capable of and governed to deliver affordable vaccines as global public goods to all nations.

4. Make COVID-19 vaccines, treatments and tests available to governments and institutions at a price as close to the true cost as possible, and provided free of charge to everyone, everywhere, and allocated according to need.

5. Scale-up sustainable investment in public health systems to ensure that low- and middle-income country governments have adequate resources to get shots into arms and save lives. These investments will pay dividends in the global economy and help restore economic and development gains which the global COVID-19 pandemic has partially reversed.

#### Help For Carrie

Carrie is a friendly, bright and intelligent young woman who says she suffers from a wide range of psychological and other issues including ME (Chronic Fatigue Syndrome), PTSD, Autism and Eating Disorders. She lives in Grove, is house-bound, has a seven year old daughter, and has a fulltime (unpaid) carer.

It's not her real name. She contacted us through a CAP (Christians Against Poverty) notice and is greatly in need of help. We visited her recently. CAP is not the right channel for helping her but the church could certainly do so. She needs a resolute and determined person who could act as her "advocate" in discussions with Social Services; someone who can devote a lot of time getting to know and understand her and her relationship and history with the authorities, and help her to access financial support from them. She is particularly fearful that social services might remove her daughter from her. Carrie's advocate would possibly need a small team of supporters, to help him/her carry the load.

Carrie expresses a desire to come into the church and to arrange for her daughter to be baptised.

If you think you could be Carrie's advocate, and would like to know more, please contact one of us, or your own church leader. It would not be a task for the faint-hearted! Her advocate could be a man or a woman; her carer would always arrange to be present in discussions.

#### Pastoral

This Newsletter will be read during our journey through the season of Lent, and close to the beginning of British Summer Time. Putting our clocks forward during Springtime gives us a joyful boost to this season of new growth, the experience of longer hours of daylight and, above all, the celebration of Christ's resurrection and all that it means to each one of us. Knowing and trusting that our future is in God's hands feels like our greatest reassurance when, without our faith, world events could fill us with fear and distress. Our thoughts and concern for everyone involved in the war in Ukraine intensify our hopes that peace may be achieved, and that, with God's help, and in every possible way, we can offer our support to those in great need.

We reflect with sadness that, so early in the new year, we have already lost three of our church members during 2022. All of them have been in their nineties, with many years of Christian service fulfilled, and we give thanks for their long and fruitful lives. The most recent was **Rodney Deval**: We were sad to record that, at the age of 94, Rodney died on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> March in the JR Hospital, after a short stay there. He had been a member of our church for very many years, and despite his extremely poor eyesight, he and Glenys continued to worship with us as often as they could until the lockdown two years ago. They met through Wantage Methodist Church, and would have celebrated their Ruby Wedding Anniversary later this year. Rodney is remembered with affection, particularly by the older folk in our Church family, and with respect and admiration by all for his outstanding photographic skills. He was always willing to use those skills for the benefit of our church, and that of the local community. He was a founder member of the Wantage Camera Club which has met in our Church Hall for many years. Another important part of Rodney's life was his involvement with the Methodist Pen and Camera Club, which was founded as part of the Wesley Guild. He belonged to it for 67 years, and was an Honorary Life Member. The original and continuing purpose of the Club is that of furthering the art of photography within a Christian Fellowship. Rodney served as a Folio Secretary, General Secretary, and then as its President. In addition to that, Rodney ran photo holidays in Guild houses for 12 years. He also had the honour of gaining the Licentiateship of the Royal Photographic Society in 1988, followed by the Associateship a year later.

A Service of Thanksgiving for Rodney's life will take place at 2 pm on Monday 28<sup>th</sup> March. We know that Rodney now rests in peace in God's arms, and pray that Glenys and her family will know that they too are held in that same way. ## Finance

**Blue collection envelopes**: The new blue collection envelopes (usable from Sunday April 3<sup>rd</sup>) are available for picking up in the church vestibule from Sunday March 20<sup>th</sup>. If you are unable to pick them up yourself in the next 2-3 weeks please let me know and I will deliver them to your home. If you would prefer to use bank standing orders in future please let me know and I will give you the church bank details. The church is very happy for any members and friends to use the envelope scheme but you may like to know that our bank now charges for paying in cash and cheques while standing orders are free. Thank you for your continued generosity.

**Gift Aid**: This is just a reminder that if the church can claim Gift Aid from a member's or friend's donations it increases the value to the church by 25% without costing the donor any more. For the church treasurer to be able to claim gift aid on a donation, the donor must pay income tax. If you are an income tax payer, as a rough rule of thumb, gift aid can be claimed on all donations totalling up to about four times the amount of income tax you pay. The reclaim of Gift Aid from HMRC is an important source of income for the church, totalling over £9,000 each year. If you think your donation is liable for gift aid and you want the treasurer to claim it you will need to sign a simple declaration. The other side of the coin (no pun intended!) is that if you think your donations no longer qualify for gift aid you should let the church treasurer know. If you want to know more please speak to me. All inquiries will, of course, be treated confidentially.
