From the Manse.....

Listening to or watching the news at this time can feel distressing and upsetting as we are confronted with stark images of so much suffering. From the invasion of Ukraine to the current state of British politics, we are aware of so much that is wrong and broken and we are left wondering what we as individuals can possibly do.

Without wanting to sound trite, we can and should write to our Member of Parliament expressing our concerns and we can and should pray.

These two actions are of course intimately and inexpressibly linked and can be found deep within the D.N.A. of Methodism. John Wesley spoke of the need for personal piety (faith) and social action. He knew that they were the two sides of the same coin.

The other thing that we can do is to make difference where we are. We may not find ourselves walking in the corridors of power, but we do walk along the streets of our neighbourhoods. We may not have conversations with world leaders, but we do have conversations with those we meet on a daily basis. We may not be responsible for the actions of the powerful and the influential, but we are responsible for what we do.

Through careful listening to one-another, a generosity of spirit and kindness, putting the needs of others first, seeing those who are 'strangers' to us through God's eyes and looking at our communities from God's perspective, we can help to bring about change and transformation and make the world a better place.

In Micah 6:8 we are reminded of this simple truth;

"What does the Lord require of you

but to do justice, and to love kindness,

and to walk humbly with your God."

Earlier this year a new Connexional initiative was launched within the Methodist Church picking up on this Old Testament passage. "Walking with Micah" is a two-year project to help the Methodist Church to explore what it means to be a justice-seeking church.

In the everyday and ordinary, in the busyness of where we live and work, we are called to make a difference. May God help us to do just that.

From All We Can

World Health Day, on 7 April, seeks to bring awareness to global health issues under the sponsorship of the World Health Organisation (WHO). To commemorate this day, our Head of Partner Support and Development, Richard Hatfield, and our partner, MeDRA's, Programs Mangager, Tariro Washaya, reflect on our holistic approach to health in Zimbabwe.

All We Can supports traditional water sanitation and hygiene (WASH) programs through the work of our partners in their communities. As well as this, our partners promote and support plans to deliver long-term health to communities above-and-beyond immediate disease control. Our partner, Methodist Development and Relief Agency (MeDRA), have been steadily working in Gokwe South District, Zimbabwe, for the past 5 years to decrease diarrheal diseases and high morbidity, especially among children, women, the elderly, and people with disabilities 15 villages. To date, they have seen an impressive 80% reduction in diarrheal diseases as evidenced by the local clinic records.

A 'demand-led sanitation approach' focuses on awareness-raising, followed by concrete action, then reinforced by community management. Awareness-raising highlights to communities the importance of having sanitation facilities at their homestead, as well as the effects of open defecation on disease. As a result,



communities construct toilets using their own resources and MeDRA supports the most economically vulnerable with full or partial subsidies to toilets. construct 1.000 'Ventilated Improved Pit' toilets have been constructed, increasing sanitation coverage in the area from 14.4% to 52%[1]. Residents also acknowledge and appreciate the privacy and dignity of using toilets.

MeDRA has also supported the supply of clean and safe water to 2,800 people in 3 villages through the drilling and installation of 2 solar-powered boreholes and upgrading and protecting 1 well. In reality, these serve a far greater population as each village shares its water with up to 5 neighbouring villages for sanitation and domestic use. In total, 2,500 households (12,500 people) have adopted good health and hygiene practices including the construction of handwashing stations, pot racks, and rubbish pits.

Continued awareness and good practices are promoted by 62 trained Village Health Workers and Community Health Club Masters. 3 Water Point Committees (comprising of 11 women and 10 men) improve governance and maintenance of the water points as a sustainability strategy. The training has created local ownership and stewardship of the water points as well as strengthening local capacities in line with Core Humanitarian Standards.

Covid-19 has served to further raise awareness and highlight the importance of sanitation; a situation MeDRA was able to reinforce by redirecting its budget to supply and distribute PPE (personal protective equipment) to 3,403 households (the equivalent of 38 villages covering 17,000 people) as well as helping villages to construct tippy-tap stations (suspended water containers operated by foot).

The health benefits go beyond these activities: the water supply irrigates village nutrition gardens where households not only grow vegetables, herbs, and medicinal plants but also sell surpluses for cash. Lastly, with a firm eye on the future, villages are now adopting 'climate-smart' farming practices focused on regenerating soil fertility and groundwater. These measures have the double benefit of protecting and enhancing the health gains made and, crucially, 'climate-proofing' communities against the impacts of higher temperatures and more severe and unpredictable rains.

Linda Chipperfield: the news that Linda died on 24th March was received with much sadness. Long term ill health had prematurely ended her ability to worship with us several years ago. It was with total dedication that Alan has cared for Linda at home until her final few weeks, which were spent in Sanctuary Care Nursing Home. Until her health declined, Linda was a very active member of our church family, and was involved in many different groups and activities.

Moving to Wantage in 1980, she very soon joined the team of Sunday School teachers, and set up the Friday Club, which was a popular social club for Primary School aged children and ran for seven years. A little later the Wantage Methodist Church's Holiday Club was created under Linda's leadership. It went on to become an annual ecumenical event providing Bible based activities on four mornings, with the highlight each year of a day's outing to the seaside by coach. Linda was involved with almost every Holiday Club for over twenty-five years.

Linda's chance conversation with an American passenger, during a flight as part of a family holiday in that country, led to the formation of a link between our church and the Volunteers in Mission Team of the United Methodist Church in Oklahoma. The V.I.M. team came to the UK and led the Holiday Club twice, and this was reciprocated by Linda organizing a team from our church to take part in two mission projects in Oklahoma.

Linda was also involved with running Wednesday Fellowship, notably arranging coach outings, and for many years she and Alan ran a very popular plant sale to raise funds for different charities. The final one was for our own Project 21. Linda's organizational skills were second to none, and included arranging fun and games for everyone at many social events in our Church Hall.

We have much for which to be thankful in the many years of Linda's service, and she will be remembered with gratitude by all those of us who knew her well during that time. We acknowledge the loss felt by Alan, Sarah and Emma, and the grandchildren Issy, Raphael, Ethan and Sophie, as we give thanks for Linda's life of service within our church and beyond. Assured that Linda now rests in peace in God's love, we pray for his comfort and strength to hold and support her family in their sadness.

Eco Church: join in to complete the survey

Wantage Methodist Church is committed to taking part in the Eco Church scheme.

The scheme is to encourage congregations and the individuals in them to examine their buildings, ways of working, priorities and lifestyles with a view to aligning them as closely as possible with God's care for the world and its human and other occupants, including responding realistically to the climate crisis.

We complete a survey (questionnaire) as many times as we like, that gives a score for each of several kinds of thing we do (or neglect to do), and an overall score. There are threshold scores which, as we attain each of them, qualify us for bronze, silver or gold Awards.

We can make trial adjustments and explore what we might change to reach the score for the next Award: both changes that we decide are important for their own sake, and other changes that gather a lot of points quickly or easily in our own situation.

Either way, Eco Church will then have helped us to make a difference.

A very crude first attempt at a survey, involving only a handful of people, suggested that we are already not far from a bronze Award! It also appeared, though, that between us we not only estimated a range of different answers, not all of which can have been right, but we didn't know how to find the real answers.

Volunteers needed then, please.

The task is to each take away a few of the 94 multiple choice questions, somehow get an answer to each, and say how you found it out. You might find who in the church knows the answers; or you might look them up or work them out yourself.
