From the Archbishop of Canterbury's sermon delivered at Her Majesty's State Funeral to that preached by Revd Katherine Price at the Commemoration service in Wantage we have been given much to ponder upon and to think about as we come to terms with the death of "Our Queen".

The pomp and ceremony of yesterday's events helped to link us to our past, our history and our heritage, and in doing so, gave us a framework in which we could focus not only upon our sense of loss, but also that of gratitude and thankfulness.

'Loving service' is a term we long associated with Her Majesty and was a theme that wove itself throughout the events of the period of National Mourning and the funeral service itself. Queen Elizabeth visibly and outwardly demonstrated that which was at the heart of her faith.

It was that same loving service that saw Jesus on the night in which he was betrayed, take up the bowl and towel and wash his friends' tired, sore and dusty feet, becoming a servant to all.

No doubt much will be discussed, spoken and shared about her Majesty's legacy. If her example of 'loving service' manages to inspire others to do likewise then what a difference that would make to the world, helping to make it a better place.

May she rest in peace and rise in glory!

Methodist Church Global Relationships

Joint appeal with All We Can launched for Pakistan

All We Can and the Methodist Church in Britain have launched an urgent appeal to support communities impacted by the devastating flooding in Pakistan.

More than 1300 people have died since the monsoon season began in June, and it is reported that a third of the country is now underwater. Flood waters have not only devastated critical infrastructure, but also destroyed crops and livelihoods for countless people.

Pakistan is increasingly vulnerable to the impacts of the climate crisis – already, more than one million homes have been destroyed or damaged, and 33 million people have been affected by the flooding.

Through Methodist Church in Britain and All We Can's joint appeal, urgent support will reach those most impacted by the flooding. By working with trusted church and humanitarian partners, donations will make a critical difference.

The Revd Graham Thompson, President of the Methodist Conference, said: "We invite – even urge – all those who have warm and comfortable homes to give to this appeal. We have so much and our neighbours in Pakistan have so little; let us give as much as we can and do so as both an offering and a prayer for the people of Pakistan."

Pakistan Floods

September 9: Solidarity Grant from the World Mission Fund for the Church of Pakistan

A solidarity grant of £15,000 has been released to Church of Pakistan, a Methodist Church in Britain Partner. These funds are a solidarity contribution from the World Mission Fund to the huge immediate need to support persons with shelter, clothing, food and water. These standing funds are able to be sent quickly in advance of funds to be raised through the joint appeal of the Methodist Church in Britain and All We Can.

September 6 : Update from the Diocese of Hyderabad, Church of Pakistan

"Greetings from the Hyderabad Diocese of the Church of Pakistan.



The unprecedented monsoon rains during the eight weeks of the months of July and August 2022 and associated rural and urban flooding in the Sindh province of Pakistan have wreaked havoc in the entire province including the 26 parishes of the Diocese of Hyderabad and their adjoining areas. The province and its people have never witnessed such monsoon rains and

flooding during last six decades and the 75% area of the province is under flood water."

"Many of the affected families have been migrated from the affected areas to their relatives' homes in urban areas. Their relatives (who are also not very strong economically) are under extreme pressure to meet their physical needs especially food. Some of the affected families are living in the temporary shelters on the sides of the roads with no food, proper shelter and any health and hygiene support to manage their living in the current difficult situation. They are in extremely poor economic, emotional, and physical state right now to cope with the scale and intensity of the current natural disaster."

August 31 : From the Church of Pakistan on the floods:

Thank you for your email in this time of trouble and thanks for the Methodist Church in Britain (MCB) concern for all the affected people and families.

According to OCHA <u>https://reliefweb.int/report/pakistan/pakistan-2022-monsoon-floods-situation-report-no-03-26-august-2022</u>

- 116 districts affected, including 66 districts officially declared 'calamity hit'.

- At least 937 people killed and 1,343 people injured since 14 June.

- Rainfall nationwide is 2.87 times higher than the national 30-year average, with some provinces receiving more than five times as much rainfall as their 30-year average.

- The Government of Pakistan has earmarked PKR 35 billion (ca. US\$173 million) to aid flood-affected people under the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP), among other assistance.

- Humanitarian partners are providing aid for flood-affected people even as weather and ground conditions inhibit access.

- The humanitarian situation is expected to worsen as communities and infrastructure are increasingly unable to cope with ongoing heavy rainfall.

Thousands of people are displaced. This is indeed a difficult time for all of us. His Grace Moderator Church of Pakistan gave a press statement and appealed on National and International level for help and support for Pakistan.

Sri Lanka appeal

The economic crisis in Sri Lanka is having devastating effects on the daily lives of the people as rising prices and shortages make essential goods, such as food, cooking gas and medicine, harder and harder to obtain.

The Methodist Church in Sri Lanka has launched a *Samaritan Journey Project* which aims to provide relief for the people who are suffering most seriously. This includes providing severely affected families with relief packages consisting of essential food and other items, giving grants for medical expenses of children who have recurring illnesses, and giving start-up kits to enable people to grow their own vegetables.

In response, the Methodist Church in Britain has given a Solidarity Grant of £15,000 from the World Mission Fund towards the Samaritan Journey Project. The need, however, goes far beyond the scope of this grant, and so we are inviting donations to the Samaritan Project through the World Mission Fund. This channel for giving remains open into the autumn, and the money raised will then be sent as a lump sum to the *Samaritan Journey Project*.

Prayer for Ukraine

We pray for ordinary Russians demonstrating and voicing their disapproval of the military actions in Ukraine.

May the Holy Spirit give us the willpower to turn our tears into action also.

May we, through our words, prayers and example pursue the things that make for a just peace in the world today and especially in Ukraine.

REPORT OF OUR JUNE & JULY 2022 ACTIVITIES

We patrolled seven times during June and July.

Street Pastors were on hand to offer support to a man who had been assaulted in Wantage and fallen to the ground sustaining several injuries. The man asked us to call the police for him. We spent some time with him and his friends, who were all quite shocked and upset by the incident. We stayed with them until after the police had arrived and had spoken to the man, his friends and members of the public at the scene.

We spent some time with a man who was apparently avoiding being beaten up by two other people following a row over a year ago! We stayed with him and listened to him for some time. He shared with us some of the health issues that one of his children is going through. We offered to pray for his situation. He was very happy for us to pray with him there and then.

Street Pastors were in Wantage on the night of King Alfred's Academy Year 11 Leavers' Prom and spent much of their patrol chatting to groups of young. We gave flip-flops to two girls who had given up on their shoes very early on in the evening! Lots of young people were making their way over to 'the field' so we went too, sweeping up broken glass enroute by the Leisure Centre and giving out lollies. We didn't encounter any major problems and it was all good-natured, if a little noisy from time to time.

One of our earlier evening patrols met a lad who had fallen off his bike near Wantage Parish Church. We gave him wipes and plasters and checked that he was generally ok. Although, he didn't want too much help from us as he was with his mates and probably needed to play it cool, so to speak!

Street Pastors were asked to help find two mobile phones that had been left on a bench by the owners. We found the phones and were able to return them to their rightful owners.

Books referred to by Rev John Anderson in his service on 18 September

"The Servant Queen and the King she serves" by Catherine Butcher and Mark Greene; published in paperback by the Bible Society in 2016. This may not be available now to purchase but someone in the congregation may have a copy.

Thomas Piketty is a French economist who is Professor of Economics at the School for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences, Associate Chair at the Paris School of Economics and Centennial Professor of Economics in the International Inequalities Institute at the London School of Economics. His best-selling book "Capital in the Twenty-first Century" was published in French in 2013 and in English (by Harvard University Press) in 2014. It became a best-seller but is not an easy read. His 2022 "A Brief History of Equality" is a much shorter book about wealth redistribution intended for a target audience of citizens not economists.

Kate Raworth is Senior Associate at Oxford University's Environmental Change Institute and a Professor of Practice at Amsterdam University of Applied Sciences. (She also happens to be the sister of BBC journalist Sophie Raworth). Her book "Doughnut Economics" is certainly readable; she argues that we need a model of economics that our planet can sustain with its limited resources, and that the current models are out of date and are not sustainable.

Community Café

Numbers at the café fluctuated again in August and September. We opened on the August Bank Holiday with just a few dropping in first thing and ended up with 34 people, including a new couple who had moved to Wantage in the last year. We were also pleased to see some of our young church families drop in during the school holidays.

The café does not charge for coffee or home-made cakes, but each week we have "piggy banks" for donations to a charity. In July and August we raised money for our church, which has provided a free space to the café since 2019. We raised just over £258 for church funds. From September to November we will be raising money for Sudep. Sudep Action is a very local charity (based in the premises next door to church) and is dedicated to raising awareness of epilepsy risks and tackling epilepsy deaths including Sudden Unexpected Death in Epilepsy.

The café is open every Monday from 9 am to 12 noon. All are welcome. Our thanks to all the volunteers on the rota who make the café such a welcoming place to come to and who provide such delicious cakes. If you would like to learn more about the café please see June Grunwald or Eileen Rennie.

Two "teams" from the church travelled around churches.

Alan and June Grunwald walked with some U3A walking group friends from East Hagbourne to Upton, Blewbury, Aston Upthorpe and Aston Tirrold. Around 8 miles with additional mileage for getting lost! They really appreciated being welcomed at two of the churches. Highlights of the walks included lovely views to the Downs and Blewburton Hill, seeing two deer leaping across a field, lots of old buildings and a large wooden sign outside Blewbury church with the notice: "In memory of Geo Knapp. Died 11 Dec 1818 aged 68 years. Dear wife and children as you pass by, as you are now, so once was I. As I am now, so must thou be, therefore be prepared to follow me".

Alison and Clive Phillips took a bus to Oxford and walked about five miles from St Aldates up St Giles and around Jericho visiting twelve, very varied, central Oxford churches, most well-known and a few less-so. We were able to enter ten and had a warm welcome at each. If you haven't looked around Oxford churches we do recommend that you do, it is an easy walk.

The two teams raised a total of about £130 from kind sponsors. Half the money will go to the Oxford Historic Churches Trust and a half to our church. If you would like to add to the donations please see June or Clive. We will not bank the money for a couple of weeks.

Holy Communion and the Benevolence Fund

Up until the start of the Covid pandemic it had been usual at Wantage Methodist Church to hold a collection at Communion Services, separate from the normal church collection, for the "Benevolent Fund" (more properly named the Benevolence Fund).

There is a long-standing tradition in Methodist Churches of maintaining a Benevolence Fund, collected and distributed principally for "the relief of poverty and distress" in the local community. The minister may use it at his or her discretion to give emergency financial support to individuals or families whether church members or not. Additionally, the Church Council is required to review the fund at each autumn meeting, and, if there is a surplus to expected needs, to decide how to use it. In practice, at Wantage, we have used the surplus to provide donations to local charities and other good causes.

This collection was suspended during the pandemic but Church Council has agreed that it will commence again at Communion Services from September onwards as a "retiring" collection. At those services, in addition to the plates at the church entrances, which are used for donations to the church general fund, there will be collecting boxes in which members and visitors may, if they wish, make donations to the Benevolent Fund. Any donations made at refreshments after the morning service are already being added to the Benevolent Fund. Before the pandemic most of the money collected for the Benevolent Fund was distributed to local charities. However, there had been an increasing trend for modest donations to families and individuals who are suffering financial hardship. This trend is likely to increase as our society moves further into austerity through the increasing price of fuel and other inflationary pressures.

How do we use our energy?

As we all get older we are well aware of the need to conserve our energy to ensure that we can do the things we want to do and do not waste it on the unnecessary activities. I know that I get irritated with myself if I have to go up and down stairs repeatedly because I have not thought ahead and made sure I knew what I needed to take/get or I have forgotten what I went up for because I was distracted by another forgotten job I noticed when I was there!

At a personal level we pay the price for this in fatigue and frustration.

You will be tired of and probably have been frightened by the dire predictions about electricity and gas costs predicted for this winter. At a domestic level most of us are being promised some relief from the worst of the short term impact by the government.

As a church however the impact is more uncertain as we are not domestic users. It will be after this edition has been published before we know whether and how we may get relief from the state. At present we are facing an increase by a factor of five in our electricity costs from the beginning of October! This will make the cost to us for electricity use about £1 per unit. To give an idea of what this means, we use about six units each day on the premises as a background and in the first three weeks in September our total use was about 300 units.

We will not know until November or December what the gas charge will be.

We know from our responsibilities for climate change that we need to consider how we limit our energy use. The "big stick" of cash cost is going to focus our minds over the immediate future. It is therefore doubly important to manage our energy use carefully.

As a first step, please, when activities finish on the premises make a careful check that all lights and equipment are turned off.
