A Letter of Introduction from Rev Bruce Thompson

Dear Friends,

Our Superintendent the Revd Keith has kindly invited me to write a few words to introduce myself, which I am very pleased to do. Karen and I are really looking forward to joining you in ministry in the Wantage & Abingdon Circuit in September. Two years ago I had every intention of seeing out my active ministry by continuing in my role as Chair of the Lincolnshire Methodist District, a role that has been a great privilege to undertake. Lincolnshire is a county that has become dear to my heart. However, as I sat in Stationing Matching Group in November 2021 I began to feel drawn to a number of the appointments that were not being filled. A few weeks later, after much thought and prayer, Karen and I decided that I should curtail after 12 years as Chair, enter stationing in the autumn of 2022, and offer my final two or three years in active ministry serving in a Circuit. When I received the profiles suggested to me we were quickly drawn to the Wantage & Abingdon appointment. The subsequent visit did not disappoint, far from it. We felt this to be the place that God has called us and we are excited at what may be in store for us all.

It will no doubt take a little while to readjust to circuit ministry again, though I think that a number of things I learnt as Chair may be of benefit! Prior to Lincolnshire, I served for eighteen years in Manchester, three in training at Hartley Victoria College (Methodist Inter Collegiate Football Cup winners for two of those three years, robbed on penalties in the third!). This was followed by five years in three inner city churches and ten years in a large suburban church. During that time, through various encounters, I developed a keen interest in faiths other than Christianity, especially Judaism. I also became deeply concerned about the complicity of the Church in antisemitism and the Holocaust. My commitment to raising awareness of the hostility Christians have often had toward Jews has continued since. I also became very involved in coordinating hospitality to Kosovan refugees during the 1999 Kosovan War. I have recently spent some time in Kosova during my sabbatical. You can read about it on my blog at revbrucethompson.wordpress.com.

My third appointment was in the county of Somerset from 2002 – 2011. For three of those years I was superintendent of two Circuits before we were able to merge them into a new Circuit, the Taunton Deane & South Sedgemoor Circuit in 2006. It was a time of challenge and change. There were also some significant building redevelopments, which was enjoyable as it drew me back to my first career in the construction industry.

I often view my ministry in fairly general terms. I have always enjoyed preaching and leading worship. Over recent years, I have especially enjoyed leading Bible studies, tending to focus on the context of the passages: why they were written in the way that they were.

Since 1996 I have led pilgrimages to Israel and I am thrilled that so many from the Circuit are part of this year's tour at the end of November. I have also led a number of visits to Krakow and Auschwitz. A number of people have already asked if I will be leading another Auschwitz tour in the future and hopefully this will be possible in the autumn of 2024.

Karen will be taking retirement from teaching after thirty-six years, so this will be a challenge for us both! On our days off we anticipate exploring nearby areas that we are as yet unfamiliar with. On rainy days I expect to be throwing a bit of paint at canvases in the hope that they resemble something decent. Painting is a pastime I have grown to enjoy more and more in recent years. Karen and I are both keen on art. I am also an avid reader of novels. We are blessed with two sons and two daughters in law. David & Sarah will be taking up new teaching appointments in Gloucester in September and Robert & Katie live in London. All being well David & Robert will be able to take an appointment or two on the Circuit Plan in the near future.

My hope as we join the Wantage & Abingdon Circuit is that we will together continue to discern God's will for this wonderful part of England and have fun in undertaking it.

A good question, How long should a Sermon be? ©Reform, 06/2023

One question, four answers

BARNABAS SHIN 'Our body clock will get used to what we think is normal'

This question reminded me of my young adulthood when I used to sit in front of the pew on Sunday morning services in my home church in Korea. The sermon was around 30 minutes, and I was passionate about making notes, although I was sometimes nearly falling asleep. For now, in my pastorate churches, I aim to set my sermon for less than 20 minutes, which, I think, would be expected among in our congregation. When my sermon lasts longer than 20 minutes, even I sense it is too long while I deliver it.

It is interesting to see the survey of Lifeway Research in 2019 in the US. Mainline Protestant pastors (54%) are more likely than evangelical pastors (17%) to say their sermons are shorter than 20 minutes; white pastors are more likely to say they are shorter than 20 minutes, while African American pastors and those of other ethnicities are more likely to preach for at least 40 minutes...

DIANA PAULDING 'Online worship brings a freedom to find new ways'

Having grown up attending local United Reformed churches, my instinct always used to be that a sermon should be as concise as possible while still retaining adequate content. Since 2020, however, my home church has been yourchurch, an online congregation. In an online church, a lot of the elements of a traditional church service need to be rethought. Communal singing on Zoom is a recipe for disaster, and so instead we use YouTube videos and encourage people to sing along with their microphones turned off. On the other hand, we do say the Lord's Prayer together and we embrace the glorious cacophony of everybody saying their preferred version at the same time.

There is no technical reason to change how sermons are given. People can listen to one person speak in the traditional manner and a worship leader can speak for as long or short a time as they wish. In yourchurch, our focus on developing discipleship and living out our faith in our daily lives often influences the content of sermons, but there is no reason for it to affect the length...

PETER STEVENSON 'No one should have fallen out of a window'

It would be good to have the opportunity of a 30-minute sermon every week in order to read the text, exegete the passage and give an interpretation. In Acts 20 we learn that Paul preached an even longer sermon:

We met on Sunday to worship and celebrate the Master's Supper. Paul addressed the congregation. Our plan was to leave first thing in the morning, but Paul talked on, way past midnight. We were meeting in a well-lighted upper room. A young man named Eutychus was sitting in an open window. As Paul went on and on, Eutychus fell sound asleep and toppled out the third-storey window. When they picked him up, he was dead.

Paul went down, stretched himself on him, and hugged him hard. 'No more crying,' he said. 'There's life in him yet.' Then Paul got up and served the Master's Supper. And went on telling stories of the faith until dawn! On that note, they left – Paul going one way, the congregation another, leading the boy off alive, and full of life themselves. (Acts 20:7–12, The Message)

However, it has been said about preaching that if you don't strike oil in the first five minutes, you're simply boring!...

LUCY BERRY 'How deep need a sermon be?'

You see, I think this might be the wrong question. That word 'should' worries me. It has echoes of churchy norms that I don't quite trust. 'Should' is a word of routine and habit. It implies an habitual way of preaching. It suggests something thoroughly to be expected. Do we want to do expected sermons? I think I prefer 'How long does a sermon need to be?' – because need (of one kind or another) was at the root of everything that Jesus ever did or preached.

Well, if need is the imperative behind a sermon, then what needs saying? It won't be the repetition of recently unexplored Good News. It won't be the unexamined reinforcement of traditional behaviours. It won't be the comforting collapse into safe interpretations. Surely what needs discovering and proclaiming is the happening-right-now Good News. And that, in all its complexity, could take a lifetime of much-needed instalments. All this nudges me towards questions like 'How deep need a sermon be?', or 'How tough need a sermon be?' or 'How real need a sermon be?'... *Lucy Berry is a URC minister and poet*.

I know that you will all be wondering what's wrong with me so before all the assumptions come out, I will tell you myself that I have cancer that has arrived and spread very quickly and will require a 12 hours' operation, some reconstruction surgery and quite a bit of convalescent time.

We, Martin and I, are hoping that this will be a temporary break in what we do and will soon be back to helping those less fortunate than ourselves in the New Year.

Wantage Methodist Church - Looking to the future

Thanks to all who attended and contributed to our morning looking forward.

In the summer of 2024 Rev Ian Griffiths and Tabitha will be leaving the Circuit and we are in the process of seeking a replacement minister to serve in the Circuit and with the hope that they will take over as Superintendent in 2025 when Keith retires. From September 2025, we are expecting that there will only be two Presbyters in the circuit covering Wantage/Grove/Childrey, Didcot/Milton, Abingdon (Trinity & All Saints) and Wallingford. For various reasons it is most probable that one will live in Abingdon and one in Didcot. This has implications regarding what the ministers can deliver as well as how often they can lead worship in any Chapel. As we also have fewer available supernumerary ministers and local preachers, there will be a significant number of services that will not have a conventional leader planned.
