

From the Manse.....

Last night's episode of the latest series of the "Great Pottery Throw Down" (Sunday 18th February) on Channel 4 had the remaining contestants making modern lighting sculptures using black and white clay.

If you watched the programme yourselves, you will know that for many of the potters this was an emotional week as they used their life experiences to inspire their creations. Battles with depression and mental health issues alongside dealing with cancer and bereavement found form in what they made.

Whilst not wishing to diminish the realities and the pain of what they had known and experienced, they were nonetheless also aware of how even in the midst of the darkness, there was also light and hope. Often this came in the form of friends and family and all those who stood by them in their times of need.

It was both a moving and inspiring programme to watch.

Jan's creation was titled "Light breaks where no sun shines" a reference to a poem of that name written by Dylan Thomas in 1934.

As we continue our Lenten journey, heading on towards the passion and Easter we are very much aware that the events we are soon to remember and commemorate take us into the depths and into the dark places - culminating as they do in a borrowed tomb and death itself.

Even when the sun is out and the skies are blue, we can find that the weight of our dark places and the experiences of this word can hang heavy on us as we face and deal with our own Gethsemanes.

The world seems to be darker and more threatening than it has for a long time and we are apprehensive and nervous about what might happen next.

The message of Easter has at its very centre the message of light and hope. It takes us back to the beginning of John's Gospel where we find: "and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."

When on the final day of this month we proclaim that "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!" may we know the truth of the light shining in the darkness for ourselves and for the world.







As is our usual practice, there will be a shared tea (please bring some food with you to share) followed by an informal communion.

For all those wishing to walk to Childrey please note that we will be leaving the car park at Wantage Methodist Church at 4:30 pm.

I have, for many years, pondered over the story of Jesus in the Wilderness and wondered what it is really about. Somehow the idea that Jesus went into the wilderness and had the temptations and responded to them, and later shared his experience with the disciples, or at least someone who could tell the Gospel writers about it, did not ring true to the Jesus I have met in the Gospel account.

There is real desert wilderness in the Holy land arealots of it. But I am not easily willing to accept surreal stories at face value. What is really being shared here?

As I read the gospel accounts of Christ's ministry, I become aware that Jesus encounters all the temptations portrayed in the Wilderness story as he works his way from his baptism in the Jordan to his death on the cross.

"If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread."

"If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down. For it is written:

"He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

"All this all (the kingdoms of the world and their splendour) I will give you, if you will bow down and worship me."

In other words prioritise being popular, spectacular and powerful.

Jesus leaves home to start his ministry with no secure income or safe place to live in a land that is not that welcoming in all sorts of ways. Hot in the day and cold at night. Politically unstable with insecure religious leaders and puppet governors.

He starts his ministry at the point when the powers threaten and imprison John the Baptist. The world he is going to minster to is the Wilderness where he is to be alone and tempted every day as he challenges the literal application of the religious law, faces the frustrations of being misunderstood and misrepresented as he advocates that life should be lived in the light of love.

"Love God, and your neighbour as yourself."

In a sense, as he did, we grow up and face the challenge of disturbing the comfort and security of routine for the uncertainty of the future, whether it be leaving home for college, or a new job or losing a job, or retirement or declining health. At least in our lives we rarely leave home and become dependent purely on the goodwill of those around us to survive. We are certainly tested as we live our lives. How good it is to be popular, recognised as the best and able to have people do what we want!

But isn't this the reality of "Wilderness" as we encounter it in our daily living. How far do we cling to the warmth and security of our lives to avoid the Wilderness?

A man came up to Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what must I do to get eternal life?" "If you want to enter life, keep the commandments."

"All these I have kept," the man said. "What do I still lack?"

Jesus answered, "Sell your possessions and give to the poor. Then come, follow me." When the man heard this, he went away sad, because he had great wealth.

Church, eh? No one ever tells you the rules. Alright, I hear you – there are no rules in church. All are welcome, come as you are, just don't sit in Marjorie's seat. So perhaps they're more guidelines. Social norms. Expected occurrences. In brief: rules. Marjorie can be fierce.

I'm easily baffled. When I first joined our church, I spotted in the newsletter: 'We pray this week for those living on Farm Lane, Fullers Crescent and Grove Road.' I thought, Wow, what's happened on those roads?! Has there been some sort of localised natural disaster, sinkhole, or very specific vandalism spree? It turns out that, no, the church prays for different local streets every week. It took me another year to realise that we move alphabetically through the road names.

Every church I've frequented, it's taken me years to puzzle out its ways. As a child, I used to mumble the word 'catholic' in the creed: 'We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.' This was an Anglican church, so I thought it had included a misprint, copied and pasted from a Catholic church's printout. Eventually I looked up the word and realised that you don't have to be Catholic to be catholic, you don't have to be Orthodox to be orthodox, and you don't have to be United Reformed to be united and reformed.

Perhaps it's because I became a Christian on my own that I learnt the building blocks of church gradually. I remember mistaking 'The Peace' for 'comfort break'. As everyone wandered around shaking hands, I went to the loo then headed for a post-service coffee a bit too early.

I once went to a megachurch where the opposite happened. It was a long service with a brief interval halfway through. The regulars expected it but a visitor like me didn't have a clue, and no one said what was happening. So when everyone got up for a mingle and a leg-stretch, I thought the service was over. It was only when I got to my car to see nobody following that I went back inside. In hindsight it was odd that we hadn't had a sermon yet.

Newcomers need putting at ease, but even us oldcomers need reminders occasionally. I'd like to see an annual 'Name-Badge Sunday' with sticky labels to remind us of who's who. There are people in my church that I've said hello to for years, but I'm only 80% sure of their names. I daren't chance it, so I end up calling them 'sir', 'madam', 'mate' or 'oi you', depending on age and status. Just when I thought this was just me, our veteran head welcomer recently asked me the name of someone who's been coming for years. Be honest. Do you know the names of everyone in your church? (Alright, show-off.)

Maybe even long-term churchgoers need treating like newbies now and then, with helpful reminders for us all. In the grand scope of eternity, ultimately we're all newcomers, relatively speaking. A few decades are nothing in God's time, so we're all fairly fresh to this planet, let alone our place of worship.

You never know, 'Name-Badge Sunday' might reveal that Marjorie's not been coming for years after all, and we've been needlessly saving her seat all this time. Perhaps Marjorie's looking down from the heavens, chuckling as we bumble around like headless chickens, thinking, 'Good. That's still my seat. I'm glad they know.'

REPORT OF OUR DECEMBER 2023 & JANUARY 2024 ACTIVITIES

We patrolled eight times during December 2023 and January 2024. We patrolled in Grove and Wantage on 'Black Friday', the last Friday before Christmas, which we are pleased to say was a busy night that passed without major incident. We also patrolled on New Year's Eve. Again, a busy evening which was good natured and mostly peaceful. Street Pastors attended to a scuffle as it broke out and offered lollies in an attempt to calm things down – and it worked!!!

In January we spent a considerable amount of time with a homeless young man. Having no work, he had fallen on hard times and had been sleeping rough for 4 nights. Being the start of a really cold snap, we tried to find some emergency housing for him but were unsuccessful. We also gave him a hot soup, some snacks, a jumper and a pair of gloves.

The police joined us in trying to find him some accommodation but were also unsuccessful. We used our power pack to charge his phone and he was able to contact a friend and stay in their shed for the night. We met the same man a month later and he said he was really grateful for our help and that he now had somewhere to live.

A member of the public asked us to keep an eye on a young man who was very drunk. His brother had booked a taxi for him so we waited with him and ensured that he got into the right taxi and made his way home safely.

We met a young man who recalled a time when he met Street Pastors while he was drinking in Wantage park underage. He was proud to tell us that he has a job now and doesn't drink as much, he doesn't stay out late and even walks away from fights. He then told us we should bring back Vimto Iollies.

We are pleased to report, that after a long period of absence, Vimto lollies are back!

We are using material by Gordon Giles called "At Home in Lent: An exploration of Lent through 46 objects". Gordon Giles spends each week in a different room gleaning spiritual lessons from everyday household objects. As a result, you might discover that finding God in the normal pattern of life - even in the mundane - transforms how you approach each day. Running as a thread through it all are the seven Rs of Lent: regret, repentance, resolution, recognition, reconciliation, renewal and resurrection.

Whilst we journey through Lent, towards the renewing light of the Easter dawn, it would be incongruous to decorate our worship space alongside the starkness of the unadorned Cross. So there will be no flowers in our worship space from now until after Good Friday. We know from previous years that, on that happiest day of our Christian calendar, the transformation will be one of glorious colour, and on Easter Day we will receive that joyous reassurance of new life reflected in all of the flowers adorning it.

PS: It is reported on Facebook that Boots in Abingdon has a box for blister pack recycling. Maybe Wantage will follow suit?


Community Café June Grunwald
