This month sees us celebrate Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit – that transforming moment when those frightened and timid disciples experienced God's power as wind and fire.

Malcolm Guite, the poet/priest who I have often used before in my letters, offers us this sonnet for this most important of celebrations.

"Today we feel the wind beneath our wings Today the hidden fountain flows and plays Today the church draws breath at last and sings As every flame becomes a tongue of praise. This is the feast of fire, air, and water Poured out and breathed and kindled into earth. The earth herself awakens to her maker And is translated out of death to birth. The right words come today in their right order And every word spells freedom and release Today the gospel crosses every border All tongues are loosened by the Prince of Peace Today the lost are found in His translation. Whose mother tongue is Love in every nation."

It is a sonnet that gives us hope for the days in which we live – for when we are surrounded by the angry and violent words of clashing nations, of different ideologies and the polemic of those we disagree with, it is the notion of love flowing from the Prince of Peace that we hold on to. We recall the plea of the hymn writer Fred Kaan:

"Unite us all to live as sisters, brothers, defeat our Babel with your Pentecost!"

The Methodist Church – Learning and Development Newsletter Message from Richard Armiger

One of the things that I enjoy doing when I am not working is walking in the countryside or by the coast. I was recently able to spend some time on the south coast at Southbourne. I had taken my son down to Southampton University for him to attend a placement conference as he is currently in his third year at university and coming towards the end of his placement year. I dropped him off at Southampton University in the morning and knew that I had 3-4 hours to occupy before he would be finished for our journey back home. I chose to head to the coast and spent a couple of hours walking along the seafront from Southbourne to Mudeford Spit. The walk takes you along the promenade and then up to Hengistbury Head walking through the nature reserve before reaching the beach huts that line Mudeford Spit.



I am not sure about you but I am aware that whenever I am able to be by the sea I instantly notice that I feel more relaxed and calm. It offers me an instant de-stress that only takes a matter of minutes to notice. It doesn't matter what the weather is doing, if it is sunny, windy, raining or dry, in all weather there is something special about being by the sea and the beach. Along the way I was able to pause and enjoy the views, the wildlife and the sea as the waves rolled onto the beach. It offered an opportunity to take the time to notice some

of the wonders and beauty of God's creation. It was an escape from the hustle and bustle of everyday life, a chance to reset and recharge. There was also the opportunity for lunch at the Café at Mudeford Spit too! It was also enough time for the car to be fully re-charged ready for the return journey to collect Jacob from Southampton and then back home.

Whilst it was only a relatively brief time I recognise the need to make the most of the opportunities that are available to spend time in nature, time by the sea, time to replenish my energy levels.

I hope that you will have the opportunity to make time and space to engage in whatever offer you with an opportunity to relax, reenergise and notice the world around you.





Flourishing is the theme for this month and so it seems appropriate to encourage opportunities to engage with nature and God's creation as this often reminds and prompts us to reflect on how we are called to consider our individual and collective response in being called to care for creation and all God's gifts. You can find out more about this station on the discipleship journey <u>here</u>.

The 'Pause for thought' prompt encourages us to reflect on the question:

What would you do about caring for creation if you knew you couldn't fail?

There is also a reminder that if you are interested in having conversations like this with your friends, neighbours and community, you can buy <u>Conversations Against</u> <u>Mundanity</u> now.

As you will already be aware The Methodist Church, as part of our commitment to care for God's creation, has set an aspirational target of becoming a net zero carbon emissions church by 2030. Many districts, circuits and churches have already begun to work towards net zero goals, an Eco District award, or other aims in caring for creation. May the road rise up to meet you. May the wind be always at your back. May the sun shine warm upon your face; the rains fall soft upon your fields and until we meet again, may God hold you in the palm of His hand. *(traditional gaelic blessing)*

How we helped on the streets

Street Pastors enjoyed fairly peaceful patrols in February and March – in part due to cold or wet weather, which usually encourages people to head home fairly quickly.

One night Street Pastors heard a thud followed by laughter and went to investigate. A lady had fallen down between the pavement and a parked car. Our team went to help get her up and check that she was ok.

One of our teams cleared up a lot of broken glass (mostly vodka or wine bottles) from the Undercroft car park, from outside Sainsbury's and from the corner of Grove Street and the Market Place.

Another team met a young man who was struggling to walk having injured himself on a skateboard earlier in the day. We helped him get to the bus stop and made sure he headed home safely.

We met a young man who recalled a time when he met Street Pastors while he was drinking in Wantage park underage. He was proud to tell us that he has a job now and doesn't drink as much, he doesn't stay out late and even walks away from fights. He then told us we should bring back Vimto Iollies. We are please to say that Vimto Iollies are now back!

We spent a lot of time chatting to different people. One young man we had met some months previously and who had shared some of his mental health struggles with us, and another young man who had been injured in a fight. We helped one man by charging his mobile phone so that he could call his brother.

Street Pastor teams now carry StopTopps for anyone who is concerned about drinks being spiked. StopTopps are foil labels that can be placed over a glass to help prevent anyone putting something into your drink.

A Caring Community for Refugees and Asylum Seekers

Established in 2013, the <u>Trinity Centre in Cardiff</u> coordinates several charities who support refugees and asylum seekers, enabling them to care for some of the most vulnerable people in their community.

Trinity Methodist Church is just minutes away from the busy city centre of Cardiff, perfectly located close to the Home Office and the refugee centre. With its impressive steeple, the church is an iconic building on the skyline of the Welsh capital.

In 2013 the Methodist congregation who met at Trinity decided that they could no longer afford to maintain the building. The Methodist Church in Cardiff and Caerphilly stepped in and reopened the building as the Trinity Centre which is now known as a safe place for refugees and asylum seekers. "They wanted to sell the building, but we suggested creating a refugee centre instead; a place where they would feel safe," says Revd Irfan John, Methodist minister and Synod Enabler for the <u>Wales Synod</u>.

The charity Space4U gives clothes and toiletries to those in need, the Welsh Refugee Council and Displaced People in Action support children and families, while Blend is a community café for refugees and asylum seekers to hang out with warm drinks and cakes to have a chat.

On Fridays, the whole building is a women-only space so that women can feel comfortable enough to remove their headscarves if they wish so.

The Trinity Centre is currently closed for a long-awaited refurbishment until the summer 2024. For the moment, all the charities are housed in nearby churches. After the reopening of the centre there will be much better toilet and kitchen facilities, heating, lighting and a lift so the first floor is more accessible. The refurbishment is possible thanks to grants from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and funding from the circuit and district. "When they all move back it should be a much brighter, much better space and we hope to be able to engage more actively with the local community," explains Heather Cox, treasurer of the Trinity Centre, "We did think about buying a new building but decided against, Trinity Church is where we need to be."

Despite the busy time, the Trinity Centre staff are resolutely looking towards the future and what they can achieve. They want to engage with local schools and have an exhibition at the Cardiff Museum. "We want to make the whole of the community aware of the building, what it is used for and engage them in what's happening here," confirms Heather. They have set themselves a target of more than 40,000 people coming through the building annually once it is reopened, compared to 18,000 now.

The Trinity Centre welcome is so warm that former asylum seekers, whose asylum claim has been successful, often stay around and volunteer to help and care for the refugees and asylum seekers who come behind them.
