From the Manse.....

For the past couple of weeks or so, Pepper has been wearing a muzzle when we take her out. This has nothing to do with aggression, biting or bad behaviour and everything to do with her scavenging when out walking. This is a tendency that led to her having an overnight stay in our vet's 24-hour emergency hospital in Woodstock!

A check-up that included scans and X-rays, and saline infusions showed that there was a foreign body in her colon - eventually she passed the green fuzzy outer coating of a tennis ball that she had picked up and swallowed a few weeks earlier.

So, whilst we are in the process of training her with the help of a behaviourist to leave discarded items alone, she goes out looking like a canine version of Hannibal Lecter.

It is interesting that there are those we pass on our walks who now take a second glance at her and you can feel them judging Pepper by her appearance and making up their minds without knowing her, labelling her as a potentially dangerous dog.

Of course, this is nothing compared to what so many people deal with day after day. A constant judgement on what kind of person they are and what they are like purely by outward appearances.

Genesis, the opening book in the Bible, reminds us that we are all made in the image of God – we claim this important truth for ourselves and equally for all those we meet or come across.

Within the Methodist Church an understanding of equality, diversity and inclusion is just one of the ways in which we seek to overcome prejudice, suspicion and a judgemental attitude based on nothing more than how someone looks or how they may somehow be 'different' to how we are.

In this month of February, a time so often associated with love – we would do well to remember the words of Paul Field from his hymn, 'Go peaceful';

Pastoral Care Arrangements from September 2025

The following announcement was read out at the beginning of each service on January 19th.

The Wantage & Abingdon Circuit consists of 7 churches and is currently served by 4 ordained ministers. From September onwards, following the retirement of Revd Keith Underhill and the relocation to another Circuit of Deacon Selina Nisbett, there will be just 2 ordained ministers to have pastoral oversight of all seven churches.

It has been agreed that **Revd Georgina Bondzi-Simpson** will be the Superintendent Minister with specific oversight of **All Saints Abingdon**, **Trinity Church Abingdon**, **& Grove**, with occasional involvement with **Peachcroft**; and that **Revd Bruce Thompson** will have specific oversight of **Didcot**, **Milton**, **Wallingford**, **& Wantage**.

The reduction in staff numbers brings with it many changes and challenges, not least the pastoral care of each church, plus additional calls on the time of our ministers. In the coming weeks we will be addressing this at each of the Church Councils. The Circuit Leadership Team strongly encourages all to consider how, from September 2025 onwards, we might together ensure that not only are the members of churches cared for as effectively as possible but also the ministers too.

A booklet will be produced that will highlight these changes and possible ways forward as together we work towards ever more meaningful ways of being church in each of our local settings.

Please remember all the ministers in your prayers, Revd Keith as he prepares to retire from Circuit ministry, Deacon Selina as she prepares to move to another Circuit, Revd Georgina, and Revd Bruce as they prepare to take up additional responsibilities in the Circuit. Please pray too for the future of our Circuit, for the Lord to continue to lead and direct the Circuit Stewards as we plan for the changes we are going to be faced with.

Second anniversary of Russia's invasion of Ukraine

Saturday, 24th February, is the second anniversary of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Prayer

You alone work miracles, so be kind to all and hear us.

Help us God, our Saviour, and deliver the people of Ukraine from persecution.

Come to our aid and destroy the intentions and unrighteous

boldness of those who go to war against our people.

Calm those who oppose your commandments.

Grant us all peace, salvation and joy in our hearts.

For you are protection and salvation for those who trust in you.

We give you glory, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and forever.

Statement on the announcement of a ceasefire agreement between Israel and Hamas

The commencement of a ceasefire between Hamas and Israel will come as an enormous relief for all living in Gaza and for those waiting for the release of hostages held by Hamas. The UN reports that 70% of those killed in Gaza are women and children and, even in the last few days, schools and hospitals sheltering those displaced have been bombed. Our churches deeply mourn the loss of life. Each person lost is uniquely and equally precious in the eyes of God.

We long for a halt to the violence in Gaza and for the release of Israeli hostages and Palestinian prisoners. The ceasefire announced today is only a first phase lasting six weeks. As church leaders we call for the ceasefire to be permanent and unconditional so that humanitarian aid can be rolled out unimpeded in Gaza. The UN agency, UNRWA, has unparalleled capacity to deliver desperately needed support. Israel's ban of UNRWA jeopardises vital life-saving assistance. We ask the UK government to make clear that the restriction of humanitarian aid in this way would have consequences for bilateral relations.

We urge the UK government to uphold standards of International Humanitarian Law. Our government and the international community must fully support the International Criminal Court in its investigations regarding grave breaches of international law.

While a ceasefire is being negotiated in Gaza, there are escalations elsewhere in Palestine, as evidenced by the Israeli drone attack this week on the refugee camp in Jenin, killing at least six people. This takes place against the backdrop of a continued expansion of settlements in the West Bank and the destruction of the homes and property of Palestinians. Our churches will continue to pray for a redoubling of efforts to bring an end to Israel's occupation in order that all Israelis and Palestinians might live in peace, harmony, and friendship.

We pray for a just, equitable, and lasting peace in the region that goes beyond simply the absence of violence. Our churches will continue to work closely with Israeli and Palestinian partners, agonising with them in their current sufferings yet confident that God's grace and deliverance offers hope for the future for all.

The Gaza/Lebanon Justice Appeal

The Methodist Church in Britain is relaunching and expanding its Gaza appeal to support emergency work being carried out there, and in Lebanon. The Gaza/Lebanon Justice Appeal will be supported by All We Can and the United Reformed Church and will benefit partners working in the area. We hope that by working together we will be able to have a greater impact on the work we do alongside our partners.

Jude Levermore, Head of Mission for the Methodist Church says: "We are called to be co-workers for God's mission of reconciliation and justice, to act and serve among fragile humanity. We believe the crucified Christ is embracing the pain of war affecting people from all parties and backgrounds and we feel compelled therefore to act together with care and compassion. We wait for sanity to prevail but in the meantime we stand with our partners in solidarity and give what we can."

David Thomson, CEO of All We Can says: "The relaunch and expansion of this emergency appeal, in collaboration with the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church, is part of our commitment to better serve where the need is greatest. Alongside our partners, we call for peace in the region and the respect of humanitarian international law by all. We're putting our efforts into supporting those who are already responding directly, meeting the urgent humanitarian crisis as it only continues to worsen."

Philip Brooks, Deputy General Secretary (Mission) for the United Reformed Church (URC) says, "Given the desperate humanitarian crisis experienced by the people of Gaza and Lebanon, it is good for the URC and its global justice programme, 'Commitment for Life', to join with our Methodist ecumenical partners and All We Can in support of this vital appeal. In the face of overwhelming force and deep injustice, we hope to bring ecumenical solidarity and practical support to help alleviate the plight of so many people who are enduring conflict in this region."

The <u>Methodist Liaison Office</u> (MLO) based in Jerusalem works alongside several partners in Gaza, many of whom have had to adapt the support they offer in light of the Israeli Defense Forces' military campaign. The United Reformed Church is a long standing partner of the <u>National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon</u> which is currently working in Lebanon after the airstrikes by the IDF. The <u>Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees</u> which is part of the Near East Council of Churches (NECC) and the <u>Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre</u> which had just opened a clinic in Gaza when the violence started, are working in the most difficult of circumstances.

The beginning of each new year inevitably generates a mixture of hopes and concerns. We anticipate what may lie ahead, just as we sense regret or relief at all we have now left behind. What greater reassurance can there be than the certainty of God's continuing and unconditional love for each of us for all time? It does not change as the end of one year leads us into uncertainty about the year ahead. We know that during 2025 our system of pastoral care, practised in the same way for as long as we can remember, will not continue exactly as before. Our buildings benefitted from so much of his time and expert knowledge, and his leadership in many areas of church life was invaluable, but above all, he showed such kindness, care and love for everyone who worshipped with us - a truly Christlike example to us.

Graham's move to Wantage in April 1949 marked the beginning of an involvement with our church, the depth and breadth of which could not have been anticipated at that point. 73 years later, on his 100th birthday, we acknowledged his amazing achievement as we reflected on his unique record of service to our church.

Member, Sunday School Teacher and Superintendent, Church Steward, Circuit Steward, Pastoral Visitor, Organist, Pianist, Audio, Visual and Technical expert, and Property Steward are among the many responsibilities which Graham held. He experienced the leadership of many ministers to whom he gave support and loyalty. His teaching and personal example to the generations of children and young people growing up in our church was as valuable as the support and encouragement he offered to the adults too. Newcomers, local preachers and other visitors benefitted from his welcome and practical assistance. Graham's 100th birthday gave us the opportunity to acknowledge how much we have been blessed, over very many years, by everything he gave and did for our church family. We now treasure the memories of times and experiences shared with him through worship, activities and serving Christ together.
