From the Manse.....

One of the things I must do before retiring is to ask permission at Presbyteral Synod on March 19th if I may "sit down", to use that quaint terminology of the Methodist Church.

The Methodist Church says that "In 'sitting down' the church believes that supernumeraries still have a ministry in which to engage, but by common consent they are no longer available to be stationed to the 'active work'. At the same time, they are no longer entitled or required to live in a manse; normatively, they are in receipt of a pension rather than a stipend."

I will need to say something about my experience of ministry over the years and what I have learnt and discovered. I have, of course, been contemplating for some time what to share with Synod when we meet at Wesley Memorial Church in Oxford.

In particular I will reflect on how the Methodist Church has greatly changed over these past 36 years.

From the difference that IT has brought (with the introduction of answerphones, computers and the internet) to the care and good practice that is sought to be expressed through safeguarding and supervision, the landscape is now very different to how it first appeared to a 'wet behind the ears' probationer straight out of college in the West Cumbrian village of Seascale.

There will be plenty of opportunities to share some of these reflections with you all over the coming months – but along with all the changes, there are those things that remain constant and are as true today as they were in the days of the Holy Club in Oxford with the young Wesley brothers, John and Charles.

At the core of our Methodist beliefs is the connection between personal faith and social action, exemplified by the Wesleys, who visited prisoners and the sick after studying the Bible and praying together.

March not only sees the gathering at Synod of all the Presbyters and Supernumeraries from within the Northampton Methodist District – but also the beginning of Lent.

Lent helps us to reflect on our faith and what it is that we believe. Each Sunday as we gather for worship and engage with the Lenten Cross liturgy, we are given time and space to ponder on the mysteries of the passion as well as being challenged as to how to demonstrate those truths in the world in which we live and to make a difference.

In the ever-changing Church we seek to serve, we hold tight to those things which define who we are for the sake of the world and our communities.

REPORT OF OUR DECEMBER 2024 & JANUARY 2025 ACTIVITIES

Street Pastor patrols in December and January have been mostly peaceful, perhaps cold wet weather was encouraging people to head home rather than linger in town.

Our New Year's Eve patrol was peaceful, and apart from encouraging a young man who had climbed on King Alfred's statue to come down, was without incident.

One cold night, a man approached us who wasn't wearing any shoes! He said that he had come out without shoes so he could feel more connected to the earth but was somewhat regretting his decision. Of course, we gave him a pair of flip-flops - for which he was extremely grateful.

One of our teams visits different areas in Grove and in December they cleared up litter in Mary Green Park and put the bins back together that had been vandalised. Several of our teams gave water and wet-wipes to young women who had drunk too much and weren't feeling well. We always stay with people until we are happy that they will be ok getting home.

The police asked one of our January teams to look out for two 12 year olds who were drunk and had gone missing. Our team kept an eye out for them, however, according to the police, they may well have been in Oxford, Abingdon or Didcot. Our Street Pastors didn't spot them.

In addition to our regular night-time patrols, we now patrol once a month in the afternoon. One afternoon our team came to the assistance of a group of children who had kicked their football into someone's garden and were reluctant to knock on the door to ask for it back. Our team spoke to the owner and retrieved the ball.

On another occasion, our team helped disperse a large group of youngsters who had gathered outside Sainsbury's. The Street Pastors chatted to the young people and were able to encourage them to slowly move on.

Happy New Year!

For many of us, New Year is a time for over-indulgence followed by a resolution to do better in the next twelve months! At Wantage Parish, we were delighted to be joined by Nigel on behalf of the Street Pastors at our 'Discipleship Day', encouraging folk to make a 'new year's resolution' to give their time and talents to a good cause.

But this week our Bible reading is the Wedding at Cana, and a particularly inappropriate miracle for anyone observing Dry January: the turning of water into wine! This has always been one of my favourite bible stories. For the Street Pastors, this might be a parable of Jesus meeting people 'where they are'. He is responding to wedding couple's immediate practical need, which in their case is for more wine. Okay, giving out alcohol is not advisable behaviour for Street Pastors! But he sets us an example in the practical, low-key and non-judgmental way he responds to an ordinary human situation.

It's also a reminder that Jesus loved a party! It's perhaps too easy for us to see the night-time economy or people hanging around in groups outside as a problem or a threat. But first and foremost these are people celebrating and socialising. Just as Jesus turned water into wine, using a party as an opportunity to transform ordinary human goodness into a pointer to God's kingdom, so he can transform our ordinary human acts of kindness – our lollipops and flip-flops - into a sign of God's love.

How we helped on the streets

Street Pastors patrol in all kinds of weather. Of course, winter brings the coldest cold, the iciest ice and probably the wettest wet; if that's even a thing! In November we spent some time chatting with a number of young people who had attended a funeral earlier in the day. The atmosphere in town all night was one of peace and respect.

Halloween is always a busy night in Wantage. We met lots of people and gave flipflops to a young woman who was walking barefoot and had got blisters. Her partner asked us if we came from Heaven!

One night we found a handbag in Wantage, which we were able to return to the owner via our social media channels and we gave some assistance to a man who we found lying on the grass by the Parish Church.

New Year's Eve was busy and noisy! Thank you to the Street Pastors who volunteered for this extra patrol. The team chatted to lots of people, returned a lost shopping trolley to its rightful home, helped people with flip-flops, bottles of water and wet-wipes. They cleared up broken glass and encouraged a young man to get off King Alfred's statue!

Our afternoon patrols have been progressing. We're currently patrolling once a month.

Lots of young people say that they follow us on TikTok and now they are beginning to get used to seeing us in the daytime. Please do pray for these patrols as they continue to meet lots of young people in Wantage each month.

Thank you to Gill Skidmore

We recently said 'farewell' to Gill Skidmore who has served as a Prayer Support Volunteer (PSV) for 15 years. Gill has been such an encouragement for her team of Street Pastors over the years, often serving and praying at our base on her own - not something that everyone is very keen to do. We asked Gill a few questions about being a PSV:

What made you decide to be a PSV? I never felt that I was the right person to be out on patrol, but I thought that being a PSV was a way of offering support to those incredible people who go out month after month. In some ways it was less of a sacrifice for me than for some others, as we have always been night owls, so staying out until 3:30 am was less difficult than it sounds.

What kept you going all those years? It was always interesting when the SPs phoned in to ask for prayers for particular situations. You could never be sure what was going to happen. I remember one night when the team phoned to say they were on the way back to base at the end of the shift. When they got there, there was a young man actually on the steps of the church in need of help. It was quite some time before they finally got in! Another time I was making hot drinks, soup and snacks, looking out warm clothing and charging phone batteries for a young man, while the SPs and the emergency services worked together to find temporary accommodation to get him out of the freezing temperatures that night. Those were the sort of occasions when you knew for sure that it was worth those very quiet nights when you felt as though you were missing your bed for nothing. I also welcomed the opportunity to get to know a lot of people from the other churches in Wantage and Grove. Over the years I have worked with quite a few different teams and it has been a joy to make new friendships. I think the variety has helped to keep me going.

What will you miss? I'll miss the feeling that I was part of a team who are making a real difference in our town, together with the companionship and friendship. Even coming home during the midsummer months as day was starting to break. I won't miss going to bed at 4 am and having about four hours sleep before having to be awake to do church duties!

The first verse of "A Light Exists in Spring", by the 19th century poet Emily Dickinson, seems apt for this time of year and for our March newsletter – expressing our eagerness to leave Winter behind in anticipation of brighter, warmer days which, hopefully, will accompany the arrival of Spring.

"A light exists in Spring,
Not present on the year at any other period.
When March is scarcely here,
A colour stands abroad on solitary field,
That science cannot overtake, but human nature feels."

In our fast changing world, and amongst the events particularly on the international scene, there is much to generate mounting anxiety. Ever more deeply, our Christian faith brings reassurance and hope to counter our fears and doubts. The light of Christ is always ours, shining throughout our darkest days, not only heralding the approach of Springtime, but bringing comfort, joy and hope offered unconditionally to us all.

In our awareness of the changes which we know will happen during this year, and looking ahead to the start of the 2025 – 2026 Methodist year beginning in September, there are several preparations to be made. One of which is to help Bruce recognise us when he becomes our Minister. To assist him in getting to know us by name, we will prepare a photo album for him. Where possible, I will try to re-use the photos included in the photo book created for Graham for his 100th birthday – giving us all a chance to look nearly 3 years younger than our actual ages! To gain an individual photo of our complete church family, hopefully you will find it acceptable if, during our after-service coffee time, I take your picture with my phone.

A few people have asked about this year's Membership tickets which are usually given out soon after the Covenant Service and the Dedication of Pastoral Visitors. The reason they haven't been distributed yet is linked to the restructuring of our pastoral system. Keith's Morning Service on 23rd February will focus on pastoral care, explaining the changes in anticipation of our adoption of the new system in May. This will be marked by the re-dedication of our existing team, and commissioning of those newly joining it. Membership tickets will be passed to all those who will serve as Links in our Pastoral Care Team, after which they will be distributed to members in the usual way.

"Each of you must bring a gift in proportion to the way the Lord your God has blessed you."
