#### From the Manse.....

In our Methodist tradition we are used to marking certain days of Holy week and remembering their significance and symbolism as we come to this most sacred of weeks in the Christian calendar.

We receive our palm crosses on Palm Sunday, remember the events of the upper room on Maundy Thursday and keep watch on Good Friday, all before celebrating that "He is Risen!" on Easter Day. But what of the other days in-between, what are they called and what do they signify.

<u>Fig Monday</u> remembers the day on which Jesus cursed the fig tree. There is a custom of eating dried figs on this day.

<u>Holy Tuesday</u> remembers Jesus delivering the Olivet discourse, the eight woes against the pharisees and the parable of the Ten Bridesmaids. It is a day of vigilance, and of being prepared for the coming of the bridegroom.

Spy Wednesday remembers the day on which Judas Iscariot met with the Jewish priests and made plans for the betrayal, hence the name "spy."

<u>Maundy Thursday</u> – the name is derived from the Latin Vulgate version of John 13:34 "A new commandment I give unto you". The word "maundy" is a corruption of the Latin "mandatum" meaning commandment.

<u>Good Friday</u> – Here, the word "good" finds its roots in Middle English in which it denotes piety or holiness.

<u>Holy Saturday</u> commemorates Jesus' burial. Typically, this is seen as a sombre day where we mourn the death of God's son. To the question what Jesus was doing on that day, a more recent answer has been "looking for Judas!"

Each of these, mark our final steps of a journey that began on Ash Wednesday as Lent now gives way to the passion and the events in Jerusalem. As we seek to tread in his footsteps, acknowledging as we do the pain, betrayal, desertion, mockery and bloodshed that is soon to come, may we also experience something of the glory of the Easter morn.

#### The Mix

The Mix offers many different opportunities for us to ensure we do what we can to be environmentally friendly. The following information is correct at the time of writing, but there are sometimes changes made at short notice.

Firstly - opening times are Monday 2pm to 6pm, Wednesday 10am to 3pm and Saturday 10am to 1pm. So what happens there in those times?

Surplus food, that would have been thrown away by supermarkets, is offered to anyone. There is no charge but there is a box for donations.

Some of us get our refills of washing up liquid, liquid soap, shower gel etc from the Mix on a regular basis. It saves on plastic as bottles can be refilled many, many times before needing to be replaced.

Additionally there is a Library of Things. Many items that we only need to use on the odd occasion can be borrowed from the Mix. Why not pop along and see what is there? Or you might ask if they need something that you could maybe offer to be put in the Library.

Did you know there is a repair café held there? They are held on the first Saturday of each month. Household items are repaired by volunteers. It is worth checking with them if you have an item that needs mending and you need to book a time slot. (Not all items can be accepted.)

There is a collection point there for Wantage & Grove Children's Clothes Bank – donations of clothes for ages 0 to 13 are welcomed.

Finally, they accept items to recycle, thus reducing waste. Currently they can take printer ink cartridges, disposable gloves, lunchboxes & water bottles. There is also a box for scrap paper (with a clean side so it can be used). That is not nearly as much as they used to be able to take but they are constantly looking to add further items again.

## **Wantage Methodist Church General Church Meeting**

Our General Church Meeting will take place on **Sunday 27**<sup>th</sup> **April**. There will be a short morning service which will lead into the meeting.

The General Church Meeting elects/re-elects our Church Stewards as well as appoints representatives to the Church Council and a representative to the Church Leadership Team.

It also allows us to reflect together on the life of the church and for anyone to ask any questions they might have.

If you feel that you would like to serve on either the Church Council or the Church Leadership Team, (you need to be a Church Member to do so) please ensure that you let Keith know in writing along with the name of the person who is willing to nominate you by the Sunday before (Easter Day).

## **Wantage Coffee Morning and Gift Day**

As you may remember from the service Keith led in January this year on the theme of "Buried Treasure", we are seeking as a church to address the issue of our financial shortfall.

We are very aware that these are economically difficult times, and that money is tight, but we have a responsibility to balance the church's books.

Keith reminded us of the four markers that help us to reflect on our giving and how we use our money.

## Our giving to God is to be voluntary - Exodus 25 v. 2

"Tell the Israelites to take for me an offering; from all whose hearts prompt them to give you shall receive the offering for me"

## Our giving to God is to be cheerful - 2 Corinthians 9 v. 7

"Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

## Our giving to God is to be regular - 1 Corinthians 16 v. 2

"On the first day of every week, each of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made"

## Our giving to God is to be in proportion to our means - Deuteronomy 16 v. 17

"Each of you must bring a gift in proportion to the way the Lord your God has blessed you."

We are very grateful to those who responded after the service with one-off gifts as well as increasing the amount they felt able to give to the church each month – thank you.

We also agreed that we would hold a church **coffee morning and gift day** on **Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> April** from 10 am – 12 noon. So, we warmly invite you to come along and join us.

The Church will be open for quiet reflection with background music being played. Tea, coffee, and cake will be available in the hall and Keith and Heather (our Treasurer) will be in the church parlour ready to receive your gifts (whether by cheque, cash, or by bank transfer) or to let them know that you feel able to increase your regular offering. This will of course, be kept confidential. They will also be able to answer any questions you may have regarding the church finances etc.

Discussing our financial situation will also be part of our conversation at the General Church Meeting the following day.

Our thoughts and concern for everyone involved in the wars in Ukraine and Israel - Gaza, and sadly in many other places besides, intensify our hopes that peace may be achieved, and that the safety and wellbeing which we enjoy can become a reality for those who currently live in a constant state of fear and danger.
