Farewell to Rev Keith Underhill and Deacon Selina Nisbett

The Methodist Church in Britain receives with deep sadness the news of the death of His Holiness Pope Francis, and gives thanks for his life and Christian witness.

Even to the final days of his long life, by his actions and his words, Pope Francis continued to set forth the gospel of God's love in Christ. He spoke plainly of the hope that is to be found in Jesus Christ, showed profound compassion for those who are poor and marginalised, and gave particular emphasis to God's demand for global justice. Through his papacy, Francis has fostered an openness to Christians sharing together in the Church's life and mission, in ways which have broken new ground for the Catholic Church. In all these ways, for many Methodists Pope Francis's witness to the Christian faith holds a special resonance, and his loss is deeply felt.

Methodists join in these days in prayer and sympathy with our Catholic sisters and brothers, who have lost their Holy Father, recognising the pain that this brings. Methodists will also offer prayers in the days ahead for the Catholic Church, as she navigates this period.

As God receives Pope Francis into God's arms of love, we pray that he may rest in peace and rise in glory.

The Revd Matthew Laferty, Director of the Methodist Ecumenical Office in Rome, said:

Pope Francis was a man of deep Christian faith, clear conviction, and prayer. His ministry extended beyond the Catholic Church as he sought to pray and work for the unity of all Christians. Pope Francis challenged and inspired Methodists and Catholics to move beyond ecumenical dialogue to be a pilgrim people walking and working together, particularly in care of creation, migration, and human fraternity. He called the Church universal and all the world to live as Jesus Christ—in holiness and in loving the poor and the marginalised.

The Revd Ruth Gee, former President of the Methodist Conference and current Co-Chair of the British Methodist-Roman Catholic Dialogue Commission, shares the following reflection:

When Jorge Mario Bergoglio was elected Pope on 13 March 2013 he chose Francis as his Papal name. This was a clear indication of the emphases on service of people living in poverty, humility, and concern for creation, that would characterise his papacy.

There was a further indication of these emphases on his first appearance as Pope on the balcony of St Peter's Basilica. He wore a simple white cassock and the iron pectoral cross he had worn as archbishop.

In the years following his election Pope Francis wrote and spoke about the Christian vocation to serve. He challenged world leaders when they did not recognise the obligation to serve others, to welcome and protect refugees, and to protect the environment.

These among many characteristics of his papacy endeared Pope Francis to people around the world including those of other Christian churches and other faiths. His commitment to ecumenism and to interreligious dialogue has been evident, not least in the good relationship with the Methodist Ecumenical Office in Rome (MEOR). Pope Francis has often been pictured talking and laughing with the Revd Matthew Laferty, Director of MEOR, representing the world-wide Methodist Church on official occasions in the Vatican.

There are many reasons to thank God for the ministry of Pope Francis, not because he has been perfect, but because he has seen himself as a servant of God and a servant of those with whom he has sought to share God's love.

The humility which was evident in his inauguration will also be evident in his funeral which has been simplified at his request. Pope Francis will be buried in a simple wooden casket in a location outside the Vatican.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

we thank you that you continue to call disciples to represent you on earth.

We give thanks for the unique gifts with which you blessed him for this task, and for his obedience in fulfilling all that you asked of him.

We pray that all who mourn his loss will be comforted and for the Conclave that will elect his successor.

We hold before you the Roman Catholic Church and pray that we might continue to work together for the unity of your Church and for peace, justice and compassion in your world.

We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ.

Supreme Court gender ruling

The President and Vice-President, along with the Secretary of the Methodist Conference, have released the following in response to the Supreme Court's ruling made on 16 April regarding gender.

Prayer

Holy God, you made us in love, and each of us bear your image and likeness, we are wonderfully restored and renewed by the work of your Spirit. Help us to see and value the beauty of the gift of your diverse creation and so treat one another with the same tenderness we receive from you. May those who are frightened, uncertain or anxious know your comfort and our support.

Statement

Following the Supreme Court's judgment, many may feel anxious, hurt, or unsettled. We need to be clear: nothing in this ruling diminishes our determination to be an inclusive church. The Methodist Church believes that all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, have a place in God's Church and trans people should always feel that they are welcome and loved.

It is important that we reassert this in the light of some of the coverage of the Supreme Court's ruling; this is not a matter of 'winners' or 'losers', and to portray it as such is at best unhelpful and at worst an attempt to justify prejudice and discrimination. The Court made its ruling on a matter of the interpretation of the law. It determined what the provisions of The Equalities Act mean by defining who may or may not participate in some single-sex activities or may use certain single-sex facilities, and who is and is not protected against discrimination on the grounds of sex (whilst noting that trans people are protected against discrimination because they are trans – and that has not changed).

It is likely that this presents an issue in very few churches, but should a question arise, please address it to soc@methodistchurch.org.uk and the Team will do its best to offer clear guidance.

Although the ruling is likely to present an issue in only a few places, the effect on those who feel excluded and uncertain is wider and deeper. Anyone in that position, and wanting pastoral support should contact the local minister or superintendent, District EDI Officer or Connexional Inclusion Team.

Wild Wantage

Subscribe to the Wild Wantage newsletter

There is a lot of concern nationally about the decline in biodiversity and the destruction of local habitats. Building developments, unsustainable land practices and climate change are putting an increasing strain on our wildlife, green spaces and resources. But as a community we can take action to change things for the better! Sustainable Wantage, with the help of Wantage Town Council, launched the Wild Wantage Project in 2020. Since then we have been working to improve local biodiversity, map green corridors and transform our green spaces through volunteer action. Wild Wantage has already worked with local schools, landowners, businesses and organisations to plant trees and hedges, renovate gardens, survey species and engage with the local community to improve their environment.

Why we are taking action

Biodiversity is a measure of the variety of plants and animals in an area – generally speaking the greater the variety the healthier the area is. We rely on pollinators for much of our food production and all species have some role to play in the natural processes that give us fresh water, clean air and fertile soil. Greater diversity ensures natural sustainability for all life forms.

We are lucky in that we are surrounded by countryside, close to the Ridgeway and have Letcombe Brook, a rare chalk stream running through the town. Populations of now quite uncommon farmland birds such as the grey partridge, yellowhammer and

corn bunting can still be seen on the edge of Wantage. Protected species such as the otter and water vole inhabit the Letcombe Brook and a few swallows and swifts still return each year to nest on buildings in Wantage. However, once common species such as grass snake, common lizard and Wall butterfly are either declining or lost in this area.

What you can do to help

There are many ways to help out with Wild Wantage: from practical volunteering and surveying local species to taking action at home and gardening for wildlife. Volunteering, events and workshops: we often hold a mix of practical volunteer work parties, along with both indoor and outdoor activities and workshops. To find out what's coming up, visit our Events page.

Taking action at home

There are many ways in which you can take action to help our local wildlife and green spaces – a great place to start is at home! Wildlife gardening can greatly benefit our local birds, mammals, insects and pollinators, along with helping to create green corridors through the local area. Why not treat your garden like a mini nature reserve?

Swift Project

We are working on mapping where swifts are presently nesting in Wantage and looking to provide extra nesting opportunities nearby. You can help us with this by:

- Letting us know if you have swifts nesting on your house or nearby.
- Contacting us if you think your house might be suitable for a swift box.
- Making swift boxes that can be put up in your neighbourhood <u>Create a High Home</u> for <u>Swifts (RSPB)</u>
- RSPB swift project: record your swift sightings

Father's Day - 15th June


Looking ahead we have a great selection of Father's day cards and we also stock items suitable as gifts such as devotional books, chocolate, mugs and pens.

Pastoral Ann Barber

The timing of this month's report is such that it falls between Easter Day and the forthcoming service when our new Pastoral system comes into being.

The greatest gifts we receive at Easter are reassurance and hope – the unmatchable sources of joy which follow Christ's resurrection. As we experienced the colourful transformation of the bare wooden cross, our emptied hearts were refilled with deepened hope and faithful expectation. At the service in May, everyone in the Pastoral Care team will be commissioned for the tasks we will undertake in our privileged role. It will mark the transition from the system of Pastoral Care which has served us well for as long as we can remember, to one which we hope can be similarly maintained. We remember with thankfulness the many decades of being visited and supported by our Pastoral Visitors. Now, as we adopt the new system with less emphasis on visiting, we do so trusting in God's reassuring promises of guidance and direction. Equipped and reassured by that promise, we pray that we may enable everyone to see, hear and experience God's care and resurrection love for them through all that we will try to offer as a restructured team of Pastoral Links.
